HAWAII'S DUSKY MONARCH.

Bright's Disease the Principal Cause

of the Sudden Death-The Remains to be Shipped Home.

Conquered by Grim Death. SAN FRANCISCO, Co., Jun. 20 - Kala kana, king of the Hawaiian Islands, died at the Palace hotel in this city at 2 30 p. in. His alarming condition was not generally known until last evening. when the attending physicians announced bis mulady to be Bright's tisease and uremia. Kulakanas visu to this country was made on account of failing health. He commenced to gain strength soon after his arrival here, but the improvement was only temporary. After his return from Southern Califor nia lest week Kalakana became much worse and during the last few days was unconscious nearly all the time, his life being prolonged only by the use of stimulants.
