HAWAII'S DUSKY MONARCH.

Bright's Disease the Principal Cause of the Sudden Death—The Remains to be Shipped Home.

Conquered by Grim Death. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 20.—Kalaikau, king of the Hawaiian Islands, died at the Palace hotel in this city at 2:30 p. m. His alarming condition was not generally known until last evening, when the attending physicians announced his malady to be Bright's disease and uremia. Kalaikau's visit to this country was made on account of failing health. He commenced to gain strength soon after his arrival here, but the improvement was only temporary. After his return from Southern California last week Kalaikau became much worse and during the last few days was unconscious nearly all the time, his life being prolonged only by the use of stimulants.

At 1:30 this afternoon Colonel McFarland, the king's chamberlain, found the king no longer recognized him. Then Rev. Dr. Reed, of Trinity Episcopal church, began reading selections from the scriptures, and demonstrations of grief on the part of the attendants of the dying king. At 2:30 Fleet Surgeon Wood announced that the king was dead. The remains will be embalmed and taken to Hawaii on the United States steamer Charleston. The king will be succeeded by his sister, Princess Lilualani, who has been acting as regent during his absence.

Farmer Legislators.

There is an opportunity to see this winter what farmer legislation is like, in Kansas, Minnesota and our own state. The idea has become quite prevalent during the last few years that we have had too much lawyer legislation. Now, in these three young commonwealths is the golden opportunity to show by the enactment of wholesome laws that the common people may wisely be allowed to take part in making the laws by which they are to be governed. But if the farmer portion of these legislatures is hoodwinked into doing the bidding of selfish, unscrupulous men whose highest motive is private gain or self aggrandizement, as appears now about to be done at Lincoln, then good-bye may be said to the farmer legislatures in this state at least. The people of our state are in no temper for fooling; the present legislature was elected to make laws that would be wholesome and that would be beneficial after the session of the legislature had closed. Will we have such legislation, or will the winter be spent and no good results come from the session.

Walt Holmes soon picked up courage and taking a stick, proceeded to kill the snake, which proved to be quite lively for it jumped and struck at Walt two or three times before he succeeded in killing it.

The boys say it is no use to go to Florida for the winter so long as you can find live snakes in Nebraska on the 20th day of January.
