The winter meeting of the Nebraska state horticultural society began last Wednesday at the state university, to continue in session three days.

Some twenty odd new members were added to the rollers the formal meeting began yesterday afternoon with upwards of forty of the first fruit growers of the state in attendance.

Equally agreeable reports were read from the secretary and treasurer, the latter being especially gratifying, as it shows upwards of \$3,000 in the treasury.

Among the visitors at the afternoon session was Hon. T. T. Lyon of South Haven, Mich., pomologist in the national agricultural department and president of the Michigan Horticultural Society.

At the evening session Clyde Barnard read a satisfactory paper upon the question, "Can We Raise Peas in Nebraska?"

THE HOSTILES NOW

Thirty-Five Hundred of Them Camped Right at the Agency.

PREFEND TO GIVE U THEIR ARMS

Big Road's Band Can Only Produce Nine Worthless Guns--Everything Looks Peaceful But Bloodshed May Yet Result.

BIKE RIDGE AGENCY S. D., via Rossvill, Neb. Jan. 15.—The hostile camp began moving into the agency about 8 o'clock this morning and a continuous stream of wagons and horsemen went on for hours.

The advance guard of the hostiles had scarcely reached the agency when Big Road sent word that he had collected the arms of his followers and wanted to surrender them to the agent.

American Horse, Standing Bar, White Bird and Spotted Horse, friendly chiefs, are now asking protection from the hostiles who have camped among them.

Mr. Hesser captured in all, in premiums, \$53.50, as much or more than all the other exhibits, which makes a very creditable showing for Mr. Hesser, and also for Cass county.

Rock Island Officially Notified That the Bridge Agreement is Off. Chicago, Jan. 15.—The Rock Island road today received official notice from the Union Pacific abrogating the track and bridge agreement.

The contract gave us track and terminal rights on the Union Pacific tracks in Omaha and over various other strips of track which shortened our line to Denver.

Governor Boyd said he would like to move in at once and General Thayer acquiesced. The governor took immediate possession, while General Thayer and his old clerks began making an inventory of the property of the office and gathering up a few personal effects.

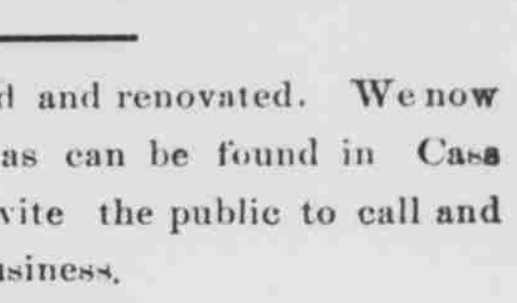
