McFarland and Mrs. Sheedy Are Charged Separately, With Walsstrom, Accessory -- The Preliminary Hearing of the Accused Takes Place Next Week.

The preliminary hearing of Mrs. Mary Sheerry, Monday McFarland and A. H. Waistrom, for the murder of John Sheedy on the nig t of Januty 11, was to bave taken place before Judge Hous ton this morning, but by common consent of all the attorneys in the case it was continued unt I sometime next week, date to be fix at hereafter.

The coroner's jury completed its work yesterday in hearing the evidence of Rev Father Walsh of the Catholic church, whose statements in a slight measure corroborated these made by McFarland in regard to conversations between them. But his eyid nee was of no ma crial interest, being mostly of the significant talks of Mrs. Sheedy prior to her husband's death. The most important part of his testimony was that Mrs. Sheeny became confidential with him, aside from making her confession and at one time gave him to umberstand that he married life had been very unhappy; that her husband was at times erazy; that it would be a good thing if he would die, etc., and once as cunded him by making the request that he induce Mr. Sheady to make his will.
