MCKINLEY'S FREE TRADE POLICY

The new tariff bill increases the duty of 25 percent on manufactures of rubber to 35 percent ad valorem.

On January 1 the managers [i.e. of the rubber factories] announced to jobbers that prices would be reduced on and after Feb. 1.
