A Curious Well.

Fremont geologists are wrestling with a strange problem just now in the shape of the wonderful phenomenon exhibit by a well in that city. Geologists have all along banked on the intense heat of the interior of the earth, but the maneuvering of this well tend to indicate an interior condition of the other extreme.

The well in question is a bored one with a diameter of about a foot and is 142 feet deep, and the strange part of it is that it spouts cold air in place of water, the air rushing out at times with a noise like escaping steam. The atmospheric current from the well is always the strongest when the weather is cold and by means of it can usually be told a day ahead when there will be a cold snap. Several theories have been advanced, but as yet the strange phenomenon remains a mystery.—Nebraska City Press.

A SUGGESTION.

How to Increase Immigration.

While it is true that the vacant lands of the west are rapidly taken up, and that Nebraska during the last decade shows an increase in population of 234 per cent, there yet remains west of the Missouri river a vast domain awaiting the hand of the husbandman.

At a very modest estimate, the unimproved or vacant lands west of the Missouri river, in localities traversed by the Burlington & Missouri River railroad, would make 100,000 farms of 100 acres each. While other states have an organized immigration bureau, backed by liberal appropriations, Nebraska has relied entirely on private efforts to place her advantages before the people of the east.

The question may very well be asked, is it not possible for the press, with but little effort and practically no expense, to materially aid in spreading information regarding the west among eastern people? Taking as their text the magnificent crops of the past season, every issue might well contain readable statements from one or more farmers, of their operations during the past year; giving acreage of different kinds of grain or vegetables, yield, amount realized, etc., accompanied, perhaps, by a brief statement of the party's possessions at the time he reached the state, and present financial condition. Urge subscribers to take as many copies as they can, of issues containing such statements, and send to their friends in the east.

All classes are, or should be, interested in immigration work; increased population means increased circulation for our newspapers, increased business for our merchants, increased value of real estate holdings, and the development of the state, increased work for the mechanic and laboring man.
