Movable Curtain Pole.

A firm in Birmingham, England, is manufacturing a new style of pole for hanging portieres in such a manner that the curtain will not interfere with opening the door. One of the brackets supporting the pole is attached to the door frame, the other being fastened to the door itself. A joint in the pole on the line of the hinge of the door allows the pole to swing back with the door when opened. The pole is held loosely in the bracket on the door and slides over a small roller in the bracket when the door is moved.
