The defendant appealed the case, but failed to have his appeal bond filed within ten days. It was mailed on the tenth day at Weeping Water, but for some reason the trains were late and the bond failed to reach its destination until the eleventh after judgment was rendered. The bond was filed by Cleghorn, both as to form and sufficiency, but not as to turning by having certificate signed time. The defendant filed a tran. by G. W.
