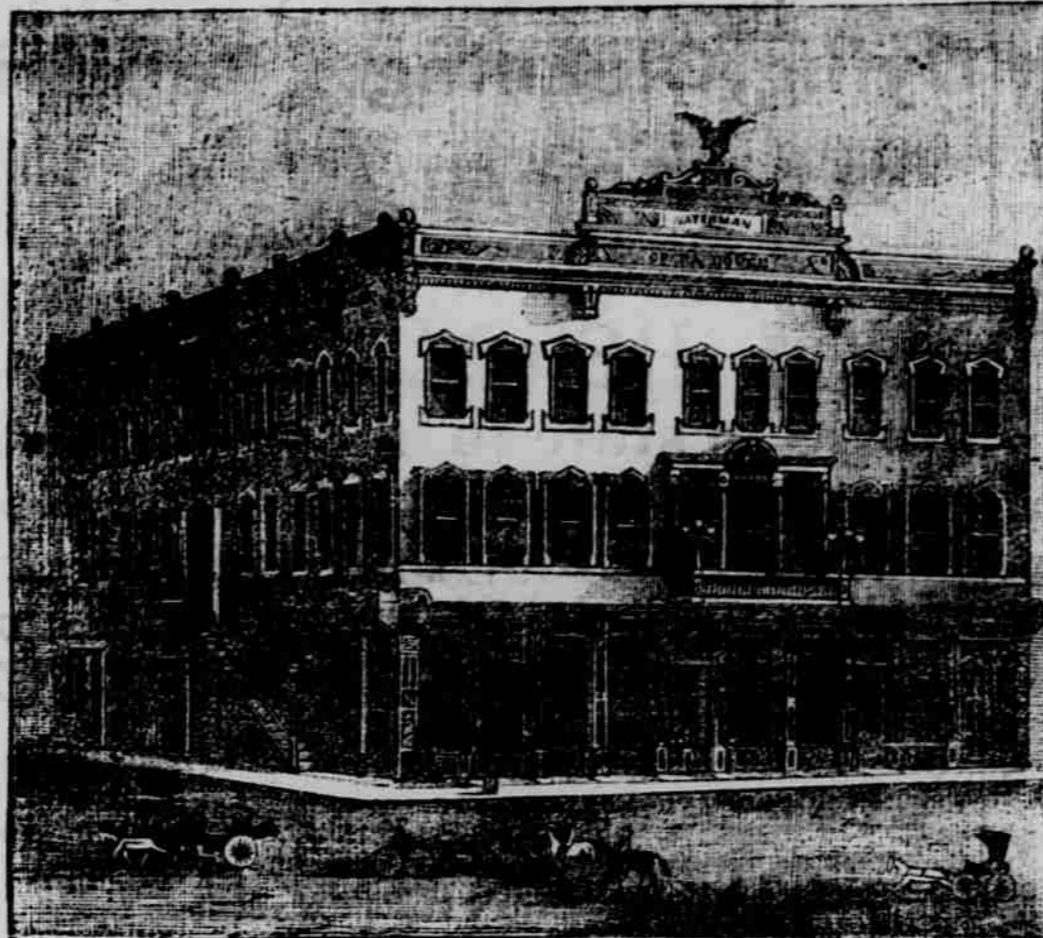

LONDON, March 8.—The Windsor cotton mill burned. Loss \$250,000.

THE MURDER CONSPIRACY.

LONDON, March 8.—A correspondent of the Central News at Dublin states that the authorities expect to be able to implicate several Irish members of parliament who are suspected of connection with the murder conspiracy.

The trial brought by Miss Hyland against Mr. Biggar, member of parliament, for damages for breach of promise, began today. The counsel said the parties were introduced in Paris by Patrick Eagan.

In the Hyland-Biggart breach of promise case the jury returned a verdict against the defendant, placing the damages at 400 pounds.

ROBBER CAPTURED.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 8.—A Times Van Buren, Ark., special says one of the four men who attempted to rob the west bound train on the Little Rock & Fort Smith railroad, near here last night, has been captured. He was wounded in the face and arm, and being unable to keep up with his companions, took refuge in a farm house, where he was traced by the officers. A vigorous search is being made for the rest of the band. It is thought they cannot escape. The wounded robber was put in jail here. Lynching was threatened, but the town is quiet tonight. Conductor Cain has died and Lester cannot live.

HORRORS OF THE AIR SHIP.

NEW YORK, March 8.—Information has just been received in this city of the frightful death of two over-daring aeronauts in Madrid. Captain Mayit and an assistant ascended in a balloon in that city before an immense crowd of people, January 28. When the balloon was 1,000 feet up, Captain Mayit got out upon the trapeze, suspended from the basket, and began his performances. Suddenly cries of horror were heard, the trapeze rope was seen to part, and the captain fell from the fearful height, turning over and over until he struck the stone pavement. A moment later another shout went up from the crowd. The balloon, containing the other occupant, was seen descending with meteoric rapidity. It crashed against the eaves of a house hurling the occupant to the ground. He died in a few moments. Both persons were under engagement to Barnum, Bailey & Co., and were to have appeared in this city March 26.
