THE CHARLES!

Makes His Escape From the County Jail.

Charles Jones who was lying in jail waiting to be interviewed by the grand jury for stealing a team of horses and cutter from Charley Holmes, last winter, succeeded in making his escape last night.

The particulars are as follows:

The iron part of the jail consists of the cells and corridor in front of them, and are so arranged that the jailer can lock the cells from the outside. The custom of the jailer is to go in, order the prisoners into their cells then lock up. There is a bench in the corridor for the accommodation of prisoners, who are allowed the privilege of the corridor during the day. Jones has complained of not feeling well, lately, and John Polin, for a night or two, has closed the door of the cell which he, (Jones) occupied, then returned to his own cell to be locked in. Jailer Eikenbary, as usual, last night, went to lock up, and Polin, as usual, shut Jones' cell door, and said Jones was in. The cells were locked, and Polin asked Eikenbary for a bucket of lime, which they use in the jail for a disinfectant. Eikenbary went after the lime which was in the rear of the cells and while he was gone Jones, who had hid under the bench in the corridor slipped out from his hiding place and secreted himself on the opposite side of the cells from the jailer. The lime was delivered as requested and the lights blown out, and the building locked up for the night. This morning the bird had flown. He had climbed through the transom during the night and skipped. John Polin today gave the whole thing away and laughed over it.

Below is the description of the man and reward for his capture.

\$50.00 REWARD.

"Charles Jones broke jail at Plattsmouth Neb. on the night of March 9th 1883. Five feet 8 inches tall, weighs 135 to 140 pounds, dark hair, whiskers three weeks growth, small sandy mustache, twenty-two years old, narrow thin face, high forehead, black soft hat, narrow rim, grey coat and pants, dark vest, large, gray, sack overcoat, boots with tops cut off also rubber boots, no money. Crime, horse stealing.
