THE PRESIDENT.
WASHINGTON, March 12.—The President is still indisposed, and today refused to see any except intimate friends.

STANDARD SILVER DOLLARS.
The issue of standard silver dollars from the mints for the week ending March 10 was \$269,000. For the corresponding period last year, \$144,490.

GILFILLAN'S SUCCESSOR.
Secretary Folger had a long interview with the president this afternoon in regard to filling the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Treasurer Gilfillan. No person was determined upon for the position.

NATIONAL FINANCES.
The statement of the treasurer shows gold, silver and United State's notes in the treasury today as follows: Gold coin and bullion, \$179,685,008; silver dollars and bullion, \$105,251,198; fractional silver coin, \$27,778; United State's, \$42,584,268. Total, \$358,188,946. Certificates outstanding: Gold, \$42,535,870; silver, \$68,714,880; currency, \$10,595,000.

HAZEN'S ADMINISTRATION.
The secretary of war has requested the president to order a court of inquiry to investigate General Hazen's administration of the signal service. The detail for the court has not been made. It is expected soon.

CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.
The members of the civil service commission met by the appointment at Willard's hotel this morning, and then proceeded to inspect the apartments offered them as headquarters. Judge Thoman, one of the commissioners, said: "We want three rooms for the commission proper, and a large room in which to conduct examinations." After the commissioners secure their quarters, they will prepare for work. The commissioners have not yet formally considered the matter of the appointment of an examiner-in-chief.

THE NEW TARIFF.
The treasury department today mailed copies of the new tariff act to all collectors of customs, together with instructions. Sections seven and nine of the act go into effect at once, and apply to all goods in bonded warehouses as well as to goods imported after the date of the passage of the act. Section repeals the duties on packages heretofore added in as containing dutiable merchandise for the purpose of assessment duties. The section of the revised statutes repealed by section seven of the new tariff bill and sections 2,967 and 2,908, and section 14 of the act to amend custom revenue laws, approved June 22, 1874.

THE THEORY.

MURDERER CONFESSED.
BOSTON, March 12.—Patrick Levy a passenger on the steamer Sarmatia, was arrested on her arrival today, charged with killing P. Hurley in Baltimore, Ireland. Immediately after leaving Queenstown Levy informed the officers of the Sarmatia that he had committed the deed two years ago, saying that Hurley hired a farm over the head of an evicted tenant, and he was induced by the payment of twenty pounds, by whom he would not state, to kill him. Levy says he never was suspected of the murder. Levy now denies the twenty pound story. He says in a drunken quarrel he committed the deed. The man proceeded to New York, but will be kept under surveillance till advices from England are received.
