

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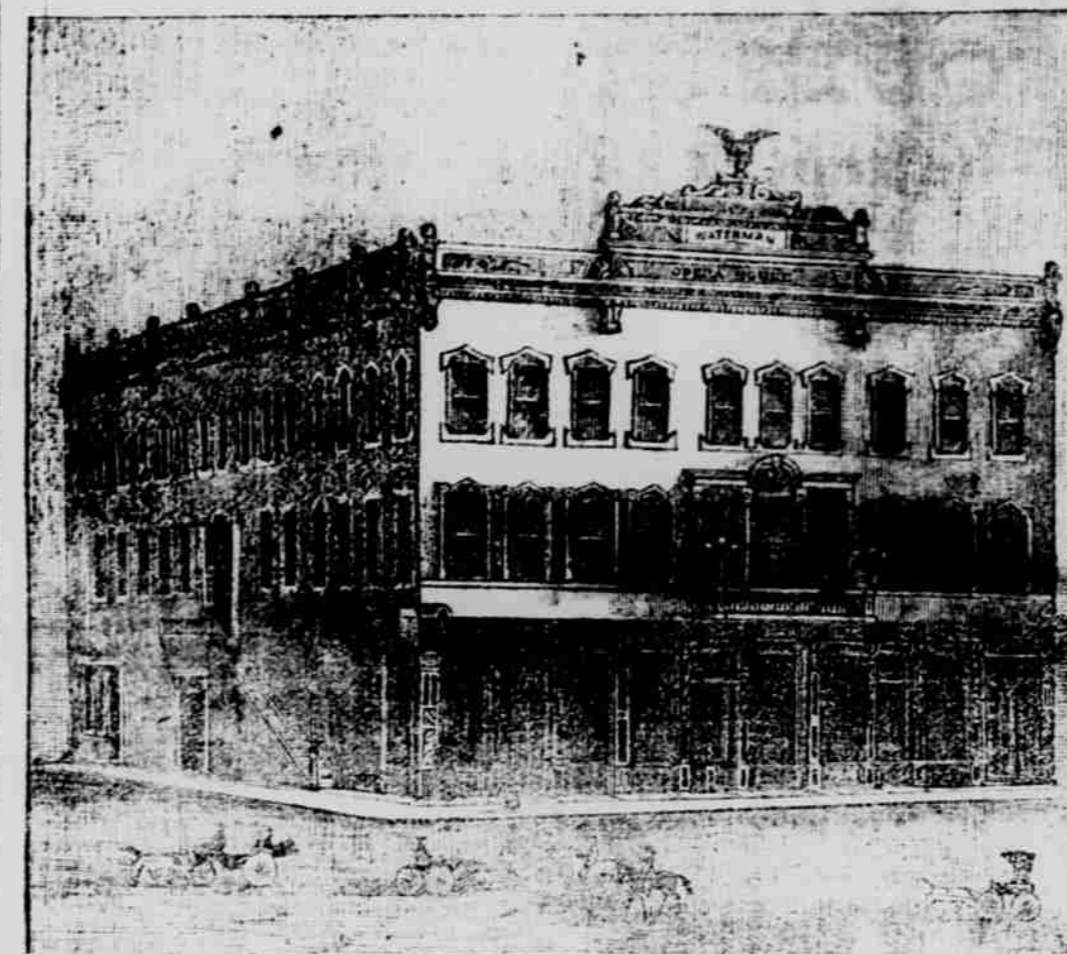

Small-pox Among the Indians.

GEN. CROOK'S DISPATCHES.

WASHINGTON, March 16.—General Crook, commanding the department of Arizona, yesterday reported to the commissioner of Indian affairs that there were fifteen Indians sick with small pox at Poch Springs, near the Atlantic and Pacific railway. The commissioner directed the physician at San Carlos to attend to the medical wants of the Indians, and the performance proceeded. Suddenly, however, the occupants of the balcony began to hoot and hiss. This drove now thoroughly frightened people below into a panic. Fortunately Police Commissioners French and Mason and Captain Killalea were present and succeeded in calming the people and the performance ceased to an end. Many ladies lost their clothing and pocket books.

HOW MUCH HE STOLE.

ST. LOUIS, March 16.—According to the deposition of O. E. Owen, defaulting teller of the Third National bank, it appears that he abstracted from that institution about \$900,000 between 1875, when he began his thieving operations, and the time he was arrested. This money was all sunk in the butter and cheese business and speculations in cotton and grain.

PURSUIT OF THE TRAIN ROBBERS.

LITTLE ROCK, March 16.—The train robbers who murdered Conductor Cain on the Fort Smith road have been pursued to Washington county, where they separated and are going north into Missouri. It is now known they are the Johnson brothers and Herndon noted desperadoes.

DEFALCATION DISCOVERED.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 16.—Examination of books of the harbor commissioners today shows that John S. Gray, secretary, is defaulter about \$40,000. Gray said he could make it good, and was given till 1 p. m. to do so. He left the office and not since been seen.

THE FIRE RECORD.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., March 16.—The summer hotel at Bocky Point was partially burned this morning. Insured for \$100,000.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 16.—A fire in Forest City started below Cullin's hotel and spread so rapidly that in a short time all the business houses in the town were ablaze, a strong easterly breeze blowing. H. Miller, hotel keeper, was burned to death. Losses run into hundreds of thousands; 150 dwellings are left. At last accounts a desperate effort is being made to save the Bald mountain works.

HELENA, Ark., March 16.—John Powell's gin house, on the Mississippi side opposite here, burned last night, filled with negro refugees who barely escaped with their lives in the overflow. A child was drowned in the excitement that followed the stampede from the building.
