Decrease of the Public Debt.

Miscellaneous.

THE PUBLIC DEBT.
WASHINGTON, D. C., April 2.—The statement issued today shows the debt decrease for March \$9,344,826.27. Cash in the treasury, \$30,035,000.

U. S. SUPREME COURT TAKES A REST.
The chief justice announced to the bar this afternoon that the United States supreme court would discontinue the hearing of arguments April 27 and would adjourn for the term May 7.

DECISION OF ATTORNEY GENERAL.
The attorney general decides that the president can make one temporary designation for ten days only, but he also decides that the first assistant postmaster general can lawfully act as postmaster general for ten days without such designation.

FINALLY RELEASED.
In the murder case of Charles P. Kring, plaintiff in error, against the state of Missouri, the federal supreme court, by a majority of one, reverses the judgment of the supreme court of Missouri. Kring has been tried seven times for the same murder, and is by this decision finally released from sentence of death three times imposed.

THE PRESIDENT'S MORNING.
President Arthur this morning said his plans for leaving tomorrow have been somewhat disarranged. He will possibly not start to Florida for several days. It is rumored that the president has been advised by Attorney General Brewster that the appointment of a successor to Postmaster General Howe must be made within ten days of the latter's death, and President Arthur delays his departure in order to determine who shall fill the vacancy.

APPOINTMENTS.
The president appointed Martin S. Chandler, of Minnesota, surveyor general of Minnesota, vice Jacob S. Stewart, term of office expired. John G. Gassmann, of Nebraska, to be agent at Crow Creek and Lower Brule agency in Dakota, vice Wm. H. Parkhurst, suspended. John Kelly, of Oregon, Wm. B. Dean, Minnesota, and Isaac Broad, Iowa, commissioners to examine the twenty-five miles of railroad constructed by the Northern Pacific in Montana. He also appointed Aaron H. Cragon, of New York, Albert Ardway, Washington, and G. Pomeroy Keyes, New York, commissioners for another section of fifty miles of the same railroad in Montana.

THE EXPLOSIVES.
LONDON April 2.—The war office has taken the question of explosives in hand with vigor and determination. Among the measures taken for the purpose of thwarting dynamite workers, it has ordered experiments to be undertaken with a view to preparing an analysis of the various forms and competent parts of all substances that are capable of being employed as explosives. The result of their work will be given to the police. It is believed the ingenuity of the men who are now engaged in the manufacture and use of these diabolical contrivances will be thwarted by this means.

THE BRITISH GRAIN TRADE.
LONDON, April 2.—The Mark Lane Express, in its review of the British grain trade for the past week, says the possibilities for a favorable harvest are now very much greater than at any period since the beginning of the cereal year. No fresh feature in the wheat market reported since the Easter holidays. The demand is feeble and prices tend downward. Foreign wheat nominally unchanged, but scanty demand. Flour in liberal supply. Maize cheapening. Barley quiet. Oats dull. Cargoes off coast neglected. Eleven cargoes arrived and four sold; nine withdrawn and eight remain. About twenty more due. Sales of English wheat for the past week, 41,805 quarters, at 42s, against 35,379 quarters, at 43s 1d for the corresponding period last year.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—Agent Wilcox, at San Carlos Indian agency, conveys the report of the presence of certain Chiricahua, but declares that the alacrity shown by the agency Indians in the chase of the savages shows their loyalty.

DRIVEN ACROSS THE LINE.
TUCSON, April 2.—Advises from Hermosillo state officially that there is not a single Apache in Sonora. The last were driven across the Arizona line Saturday, about two hundred strong. Gen. Crook and Gen. Curtis have been in consultation by telegraph for four hours. It is thought the Mexican troops will co-operate in Arizona.

CONCENTRATION OF TROOPS.
ST. LOUIS, April 2.—A dispatch from San Carlos, New Mexico, reports that two bands of the Chiricahua Indians entered the reservation on Saturday, and that at noon that day were within two miles of the agency building, moving in the direction of Globe. Couriers were sent in all directions to warn settlers. Lieutenant Davis, with a company of Indian scouts, and a band of volunteer Indians, started in pursuit early Sunday morning, and captured one warrior, who is believed to have been concerned in the killing of a chief of the scouts at Sterling a year ago. Lieutenant Davis will search the country for their trail. The rumor that a fight took place between the San Carlos and Chiricahua Indians has not been confirmed. Troops are concentrated at Benson, Wilcox and Sapor. It is estimated that the hostilities in Arizona will not number over 100.

MARINE EXHIBITION.
YOKOHAMA, April 2.—The exhibition of marine products and fishing implements opened the first of March in Tokio. 1,500 varieties of fish were shown, with other productions from the sea, lake and river.

FINALLY ARRESTED.
BOSTON, April 2.—Philip Ryan, Jr., Chicago, alleged embezzler of \$20,000 from the Sand Blast company of Wilmington, Delaware, for whom the officers have been searching for a year, was arrested today. He claims that the money was spent for the benefit of the company, and will not return without a requisition.

TRAIN WRECKED.
ST. LOUIS, April 2.—The Iron Mountain train due at 6:17 a. m., struck a rock weighing several tons, which had rolled on the track at Bashberry, a small town twenty-five miles distant. The engine rolled down the bank into the river, the baggage car was thrown from the track, and the smoker derailed. Engineer McGovern and the fireman were seriously injured. The passengers were uninjured.

IMPORTED LIQUOR.
LOUISVILLE, April 2.—A dispatch was received this morning by local distillers from Ottawa announcing that the dominion government has decided to admit importations of whisky from the United States. Pratt, secretary of the wine and liquor association, telegraphs that an order is prepared to be issued tomorrow or next day, but make no move until you hear from me as to the details.

Proposals will also be received at this office up to the day and hour above named, for the mine of the line of the Union Pacific Railway, of eight thousand tons of Coal, of 2200 pounds to the ton.
