A COUNTERFEITER CAPTURED.

A Noted Musician Coming.

Business Failures, Small Pox, Etc.

ARREST OF COUNTERFEITERS.

KANSAS CITY, April 6.—A Journal Reporter, Missouri, special says Sheriff Rogers and posse last night descended upon a cabin six miles east of town and captured George Cleandring, with a counterfeiting outfit and sixty dollars, part of the latter still in the mould.

SHORT IN HIS ACCOUNTS.

SPARTA, Wis., April 6.—D. N. Cargill, a well known produce and stock dealer, and for two years town treasurer, is a defaulter of upwards of \$13,000. It is alleged that the money was used in his business, and lost in grain speculations. The deficiency was discovered upon an examination of his accounts previous to his re-election.

FLOOD AT NIAGARA FALLS.

NIAGARA FALLS, April 6.—The heavy rains of the past thirty-six hours have caused a flood here. The streets are covered to a depth of two feet. Several thousand dollars damage has been done to goods in stores and cellars. Fifty feet of the Canada Southern tracks washed away. Trains will not be able to run to Niagara till tomorrow.

BUSINESS FAILURES.

NEW YORK, April 6.—Business failures for the last seven days as reported to the mercantile agency of R. G. Dun & Co., number 197, compared with 182 for last week. The distribution of the failures is as follows: New England states 11, western 58, middle 26, southern 46, Pacific states and territories 14, New York City 13, and Canada 29.

GOLD CERTIFICATES.

CHICAGO, April 6.—Bankers in this city, in view of the action of the secretary of the treasury in refusing to exchange gold certificates held by them for other denominations at the sub-treasury here, have decided to send all their applications to New York for exchange into gold, and for the future to have nothing to do with "sub-certificates."

CHILD LABOR.

MILWAUKEE, April 5.—It is estimated that the labor bill passed by the legislature imposing a fine and imprisonment in case of employment of children under fourteen years of age, will throw nearly 3,000 out of employment in this city. Large cigar manufacturers employ a considerable number, and several hundred are employed as sorters in rag and junk shops.

A NOTED MUSICIAN.

NEW YORK, April 6.—Max Bruch, a famous German composer, organizer and leader of male choruses, will arrive about April 11. His coming is regarded as an event of much importance in the music world, this being his first visit to America. Upon his arrival he will be received by the Arion society and delegates from leading German musical societies. His first appearance in New York will be with the Oratorio society, at the Academy of Music, on the 18th instant.

SMALL POX.

KANSAS CITY, April 6.—In response to an inquiry regarding the report of devastation by small-pox at Galena and Empire City, L. C. Weedy, postmaster at Galena, telegraphs as follows: "Three cases of small-pox at Galena and four at Empire City. Six deaths in the past ten days. Plenty of funds on hand. Business goes on as usual. Excitement all with outsiders."

THE "PASS" AGREEMENT.

CHICAGO, April 6.—A meeting of the railways running west and south-west from here interested in the agreement not to issue passes to shippers, from which agreement the Chicago & Alton road gave notice of withdrawal last Saturday, reconvened today. The committee appointed last night reported a plan substantially the same as that now in force to cover the current year. It provides that any member may withdraw after thirty days' written notice, and fixes the penalties for violation of the terms of agreement as follows: First offense, \$10; second, \$200; third and subsequent offenses, \$500.

The Iowa trunk line association met and admitted the Illinois Central to the pool, to take effect from April 1.

THE QUEEN'S CONDITION.

LONDON, April 6.—The queen took another drive today. She cannot yet walk with comfort.

EMIGRANTS.

LONDON, April 6.—The steamer Britania, from Naples, with 1,000 emigrants for the United States, passed Gibraltar today.

STARTED OUT.

VIENNA, April 6.—The whole Hungarian colony at Bukovina, numbering about 20,000, have determined to leave the place, owing the insufficiency of crops to feed the population.

SKIPPED.

MONTREAL, April 6.—T. H. Hodgson, wholesale cheese and butter merchant, arrested in Stoney bank, Montreal, for obtaining advances, compromised with the bank for \$60,000 and fled across the line to escape other creditors.

BISMARCK.

BERLIN, April 6.—It is stated in the papers that Bismarck in reply to a letter of congratulation from the crown prince on the occasion of the chancellor's birthday, declared that he intended to devote the run inter of his life to consolidating the finances of the Empire.

THE GLASGOW EXPLOSIONS.

GLASGOW, April 6.—The statement is made that the arrest at Liverpool furnish the police with a clue to the recent explosions in Glasgow. According to the latest information the intent is that these explosions should be on comprehensive scale. The plot included the destruction of the canal viaduct. They were only partially successful. Several detectives have started for Liverpool to work out the evidence.

THE EXCITEMENT.

LONDON, April 6.—The interest in the nitro glycerine discoveries continues to grow, and the excitement is intense. The newspapers are making the most of their opportunity, and selling frequent editions with such headings as "A Plot to Blow up London." The contents of editorial and local news seek to connect the arrest of the four dynamite prisoners with the advice given by O'Donovan Rossa to Irishmen to burn up everything belonging to the English except their coal.

BISMARCK'S LETTER.

BERLIN, April 6.—Bismarck, in a letter to the Reichstag, announces in a curt manner, and without offering an explanation, the arrest and subsequent release at Kiel of members of deputes who had attended the socialist congress at Copenhagen.

AMERICAN PORK.

Notwithstanding the numerous protests which are being received from America against the injustice of prohibiting the importation of American pork into Germany, the government is evidently influenced by sanitary reasons, and seem determined to enforce the statute making such importations unlawful.

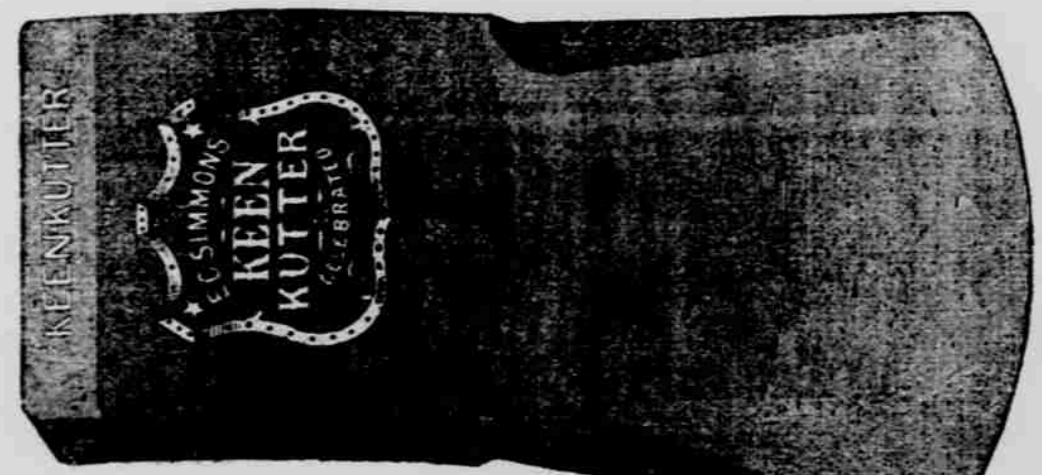

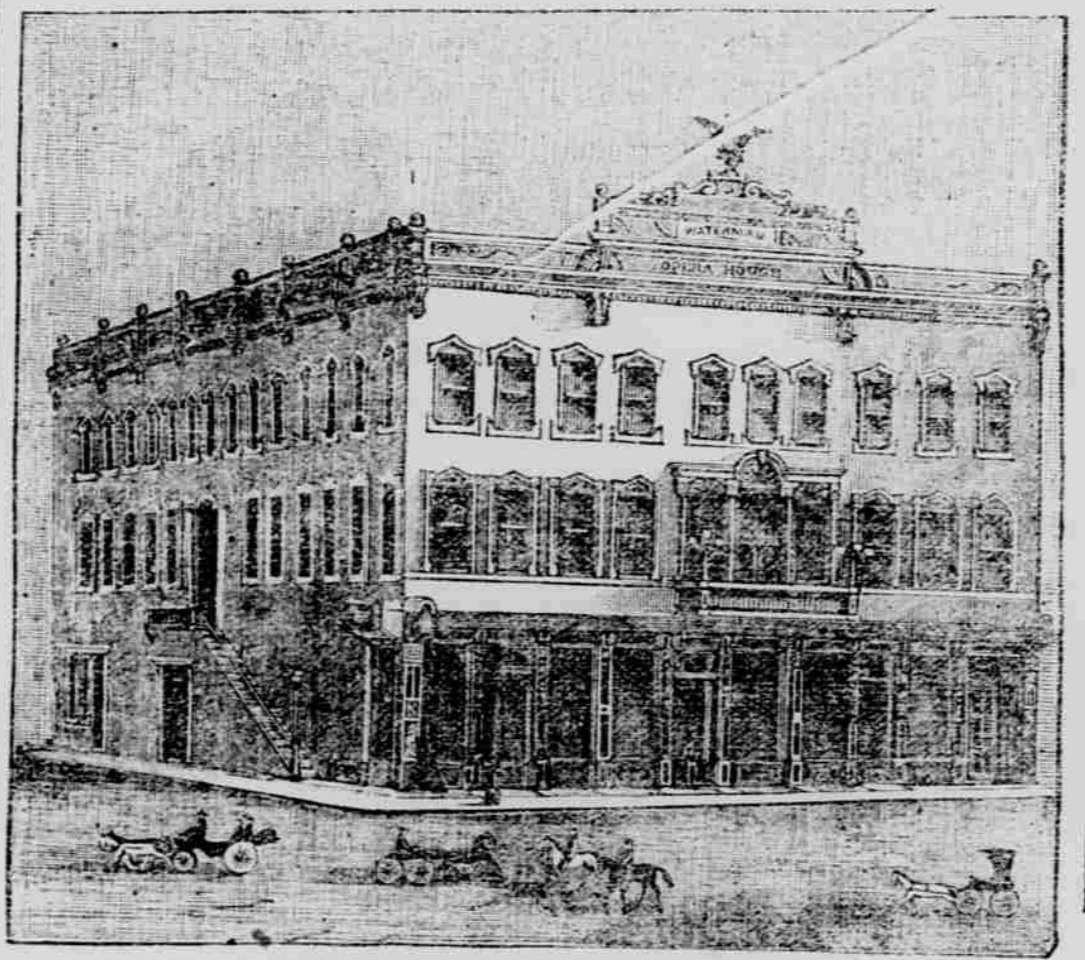
