### WASHINGTON NEWS.

### U. S. FUNDS NEARLY COUNTED.

#### Other Matters.

**COUNTING THE CASH.**  
WASHINGTON, April 18.—The count of the cash in the United States treasury will be finished tomorrow. The counting committee will then examine the books and accounts.

**STAMPS TO BE REDEEMED.**  
The commissioner of internal revenue has decided to redeem stamps, and to return to owners with the word "redeemed" printed upon each check, all checks and drafts bearing two cent internal revenue stamps, which remain unused July 1. These checks and drafts can then be used in the regular course of business.

**CHOLERA DISAPPEARED.**  
A report has been received by the national board of health that cholera, which prevailed to an alarming extent in China, Japan and India has disappeared. A report has also been received that small-pox is raging in Rio Janeiro.

**CHALMERS DETHRONED.**  
Postmaster General Gresham today directed that in making postoffice appointments in Mississippi the recommendations of ex-Congressman Chalmers shall be given no greater weight than may be properly attached to them as the recommendations of a private citizen.

**THE CIVIL SERVICE.**  
Judge Thomas said tonight that the rules drawn up by the civil service committees differed somewhat, but not materially, from those employed by the former committee, but that in his opinion they would fairly test the qualifications of those competing for office. On being interrogated as to certain statements credited to him that a wholesale discharge of government employes on the incoming of a new administration was forbidden by law, he asserted that what he has said was that the power to dismiss from office was not abridged by the bill, but that all appointments to office must be made from among those found competent, without regard to party.

**LAND LEAGUE CONVENTION.**  
PHILADELPHIA, April 18.—The local Irish societies have completed arrangements for the land league convention on the 25th and 26th.

**THE MUTUAL UNION.**  
NEW YORK, April 18.—At a meeting of the stockholders of the Mutual Union Telegraph company today the lease of its lines to the Western Union company was unanimously ratified.

**BUCKET SHOP BILL KILLED.**  
SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 18.—In the senate the bucket shop bill, by which it was sought to compel the Chicago board of trade to furnish outside grain speculating rooms with the market quotations, was killed.

**ILLINOIS ON THE LIQUOR QUESTION.**  
CHICAGO, April 18.—Throughout Illinois yesterday forty-eight cities and towns voted upon the liquor question in balloting for municipal officers. Seventeen decided for prohibition or anti-license, and of the latter six were for high license. Four towns ignored the saloon question, and voted on straight political issues.

**WILL MOVE ON THE APACHES.**  
EL PASO, April 18.—The Times says editorially: "General Crook will have supreme command of both the American and Mexican troops. He will enlist a hundred and fifty San Carlos Apaches, which move to Sonora. The most vigorous campaign will be immediately commenced. Both American and Mexican officers believe that annihilation only will make peace possible."

**THE COUNCIL BLUFFS & NORTHERN.**  
COUNCIL BLUFFS, April 18.—At a meeting of the stockholders of the Council Bluffs & Northern railway held here to-night, arrangements were made to send engineers on the line tomorrow with a view to making a survey at the earliest possible time. The proposed road will be built as fast as money, brains and energy can do it. All interested are enthusiastic in an early completion.

### MELD UP.

**ROCK ISLAND, April 18.**—A ripple of excitement was occasioned in police circles this evening about 8 o'clock. A German and his wife went to the Burlington depot to depart on the 9 p. m. train for St. Louis. They were followed closely by two men, and when they got inside the car the men who had followed held them up and robbed them of \$400 in cash, and two checks for \$400 and \$300. The police are on track of the robbers.

**NEW YORK REPUBLICANS.**  
NEW YORK, April 18.—The republican central committee adopted resolutions inviting suggestions from all parties desirous of forming one earnest and harmonious organization of the republican party in this city. The committee to receive suggestions and report a plan of organization includes John O'Brien, Colonel Charles Spencer, William David, Loyd Aspinwall, Chauncey Depew, Theodore Dwight, Whitelaw Reid, George Jones, and Hugh Hastings.

**THE MARSHALL FAILURE.**  
PITTSBURG, April 17.—The failure yesterday of Jas. Marshall & Co., iron pipe manufacturers, was the all important topic in commercial and financial circles today. The liabilities are considerably heavier than reported, and will not be less than \$1,000,000. Of this amount, \$300,000 is to Marshall, and the total assets will cover all but \$300,000. The failure was the result purely of speculation and the condition of the iron trade. The firm was in no way responsible. It has no effect whatever upon trade, and no bad result to the pig iron trade, and ore mines will not suffer therefrom.

### RAIDING THE GAMBLERS.

**NEW YORK, April 18.**—Patrick Egan says after the Philadelphia convention he will look into the flour mill interests of the west, and then return to Ireland.

The gamblers of the city are dismayed at the action on the advice of Recorder Smith. He said the police could confiscate gambling apparatus and under warrants issued by that magistrate, Inspector Byrnes made another raid on seven gambling houses. From five all the gambling paraphernalia had been removed. In two the furniture were seized, but no arrest. Inspector Byrnes says he intends following the gamblers until they are all cleaned out. In most of them the furniture was stored away, and the places left bare. The captured property is valued at \$1,500.

#### Curley's Trial, Etc.

#### DOMINION AWARD.

**MONTREAL, April 18.**—The Dominion government awarded the French company \$40,000 a year for a monthly line of steamers between Havre and Montreal.

#### BOOTH'S ENGAGEMENT ENDED.

**VIENNA, April 18.**—Edwin Booth ended his engagement tonight. He was loudly applauded, and at the close of the performance was presented with floral wreaths, representing the stars and stripes and the colors of the city of Vienna.

#### IN COMMONS.

**LONDON, April 18.**—Sir Herbert Maxwell asked whether Peter Tynan, identified as "No. 1", was in New York, and whether extradition would be demanded. The under secretary of foreign affairs replied that Sir Herbert must give formal notice of the question before a reply would be given.

#### CURLEY FOUND GUILTY.

**DUBLIN, April 18.**—On the resumption of the trial of Dave Curley this morning Adams began argument for the defense, and he decided that the evidence given by Kavanagh did not show that Curley was at Phoenix Park May 6. His presence there said Adams, was indicated by James Carrey who said Curley was in command, and Carrey so swore to save his own neck. He was doubtless in command himself of the assassins. Porter, attorney general for Ireland, responded for the crown. The judge then delivered his charge to the jury. He spoke strongly against the reliability of the evidence to prove an alibi. He pointed out that there could not be the slightest doubt that the murders were perpetrated at the instigation of the secret societies with which the prisoner was indisputably connected. The charge was completed at half past two. The jury retired immediately, and after a short absence returned to the court room finding Curley guilty as charged in the indictment. The prisoner was asked if he had anything to say why sentence should not be pronounced. He said he had not expected any mercy from the court. He was a member of the inviolables, but was not in Phoenix park on the evening the murders were committed. He loved his country and could suffer for her. The witnesses for the crown were themselves. Curley also expressed his

was a Fenian. After the prisoner had had finished he was sentenced to be hanged on the 18th day of May. As the officers were taking the prisoner from the dock he cried out in a loud voice "God save Ireland."
