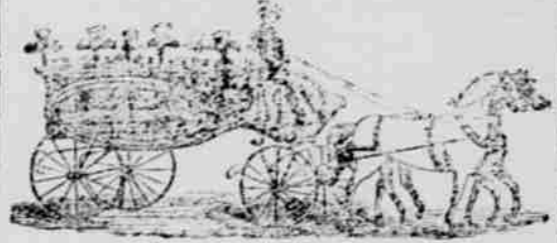

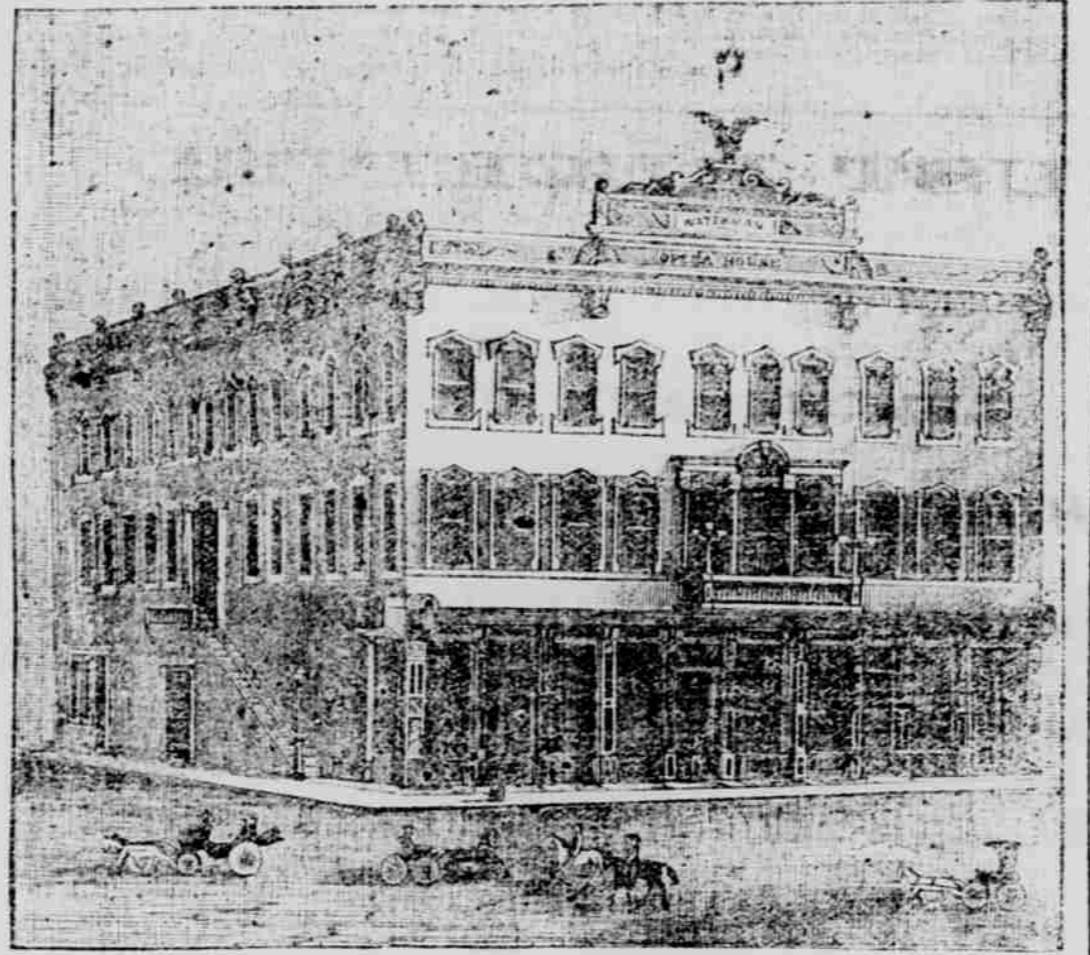

OTHER LANDS.

The Universal Exhibition Opened

Sentenced to be Hanged.

THE UNIVERSAL EXHIBITION.
AMSTERDAM, May 2.—The king opened the universal exhibition here yesterday. The American department is not yet complete.

SHE RENOUNCES ALL CLAIMS.
MARSEILLE, May 2.—The ex-Empress Eugenie has renounced all claims to the chateau presented by the municipality of Marseilles to Napoleon the Third. The municipality will pay the costs.

UNIVERSAL FISHERIES EXHIBITION.
LONDON, May 2.—The arrangement of exhibits in the American department of the Universal fisheries exhibition is nearly completed. Eight hundred cases from the United States arrived in excellent condition. Perishable exhibits are not yet unpacked.

BOTH PLEAD GUILTY.

DUBLIN, May 2.—Patrick Delaney and Thomas Caffrey, two more of the men charged with the murder of Cavendish and Burke, were arraigned for trial this morning. They created a sensation in the court room by pleading guilty to the charge against them. Both were sentenced to be hanged on the second of June.

AN EXPLANATION.

LONDON, May 2.—The Times publishes a special from Berlin, which undertakes to explain the misunderstanding or misrepresentation on the part of the North German Gazette of Minister Sargent's report to his government on the pork question. The Gazette now endeavors to explain its attack on the ground of an incorrect translation of Minister Sargent's report, and the Times correspondent characterizes this as a weak and transparent attempt of the management of the Gazette to excuse what the correspondent declares was a gross misrepresentation of the truth.

THE TRIPLE ALLIANCE.

PARIS, May 2.—The minister of foreign affairs, speaking in the senate on the triple alliance, said he believed sincerely the declarations of the Italian foreign minister and the Hungarian premier, that no idea of aggression against France was entertained. He believed the alliance would in no way change the relations of France with the powers. France must be prudent, for a vanquished country which is regaining its strength, and which is compelled to maintain a large defensive force, must not be surprised and find itself exposed to jealousies and distrusts.

FROM WASHINGTON.

The Extradition Treaty.

A PROCLAMATION.

WASHINGTON, May 2.—President Arthur has made proclamation of a supplemental extradition treaty between the United States and Spain.

STAR ROUTES.

Bliss continued his address to the jury, particularly dwelling upon Rendell's evidence. When court adjourned Bliss had not concluded his address.

HOWGATE'S APPEAL.

The court today heard the argument for Captain Howgate on appeal from the decision of Justice McArthur, dismissing his application for vacating an attachment aggregating nearly \$100,000 against Howgate's property, because the suit had been brought by a special counsel instead of the United States attorney. The court reserved decision.

NATIONAL BANKS.

Comptroller Knox reports the number of new national banks organized in the past six months, 132, with capital of \$14,953,000. Of these banks, ten, having capital of \$2,970,000, are located in Illinois; nine, having capital of \$850,000, in Iowa, and six, with capital of \$325,000, in Nebraska. Increase in the capital of other national banks in the last six months, \$677,500. Increase in circulation, \$3,299,800.

THE CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Dorman B. Eaton, of the civil service commission, said this evening that one of the clauses of the new civil service law provides that applicants shall be distributed among the states and territories in proportion to the population, as far as practicable, but as this clause comes with several others under the common head of provisions which are to be carried out only so far as good administration of the law will

permit, he did not think it would prove a source of much difficulty. Of course examination would be made with a view to supplying the appointing power with good material.

ABOUT LAND GRANT RAILROADS.

Judge Lawrence, first comptroller of the treasury, renders a decision today in favor of the St. Louis & San Francisco railway, upon its claim for the transportation of stationery on account of the United States from St. Louis to Springfield, Missouri. The question involved was whether land grant railroad companies are entitled to pay by the government for the transportation service, in view of the fact that the act making the grant to the company provides that the railroad shall remain a public highway for the use of the government of the United States free from tolls or other charges. Lawrence holds that congress had passed subsequent acts and made appropriations for the payment of land grant railroads which had not received aid in government bonds, of fifty per cent of the full amount due for transportation, and that said above company is entitled to fifty per cent of its usual charges, provided it reimburses claim for the balance.

IT MEANS THE "CARRION PLAY."

HARRISBURG, May 2.—The senate passed a bill prohibiting any attempts to impersonate or represent any being recognized as the Divinity in the old or new testaments, in any public performance.

LARGE OPIUM SHIPMENT.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 2.—One hundred thousand dollars was paid by Jones & Co., into the custom house for duties on shipments of opium, the largest amount paid for a year past. They state they expect a larger one next month.

A RAVING MANIAC.

ATCHESON, May 2.—Clara J. Wilson, the young girl confined in jail for attempting to set fire to several buildings, is now a raving maniac, and as the Missouri authorities have not been heard from, she will soon be incarcerated in the Kansas insane asylum.

MOVEMENTS OF CROOK.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 2.—An El Paso dispatch states that Gen. Crook crossed into Mexico and has been in the Sierra Madre mountains four days in pursuit of Apaches. The Mexican authorities co-operated by sending two companies of troops into the field.

THE EXODUSTERS AGAIN.

ST. LOUIS, May 2.—A party of fifty negroes, exodusters, from Ky., arrived here today, and left on the Chicago & Alton for Kansas. They said that they were the advance guard of many more who expect to settle near Topeka, and that the emigration westward from Kentucky of blacks would be very heavy next fall.

HIGH LICENSE.

DANVILLE, Ill., May 2.—The council last night fixed the saloon license at \$600. Today all the saloon-keepers struck, and closed their places. Two hundred citizens signed a call for a meeting on the public square to agitate a movement for a further increase to \$1,000. Upon hearing of this movement the saloon men yielded, and agreed to pay \$600.

COMMITTED SUICIDE.

VINCENNES, Ind., May 2.—Early this morning Hon. W. B. Scarrigh, mayor of this city, committed suicide by shooting himself. He fired two shots, one taking effect near the right nipple, and the other in the right temple. He has been mayor six years, and was candidate for re-election yesterday, but was defeated. It is believed his defeated prompted the act.

MARAUDING INDIANS.

ST. LOUIS, May 2.—Late advices from New Mexico say reports of Indian maraudings are again coming in. A negro renegade, a Mesquero Apache with twenty of Victoria's old band, attacked a pack train a day or so ago, near White Sands, and three companies of cavalry have started in pursuit. Another smaller band raided a ranch at Alamo Springs, Colorado. Eosythe has sent two companies of the Fourth cavalry after them.

INDICTED FOR MURDER.

CINCINNATI, May.—A Commercial-Gazette Harrodsburg, Kentucky, special says the grand jury to day returned an indictment for murder against Hon. Phil B. Thompson Jr. for killing W. H. Davis, April 27th. Thompson will be arrested tomorrow. The indictment creates surprise, though it is generally approved. The defendant expected it. It is expected that the prisoner's father, who is one of the ablest lawyers in the state, will be counsel for his son. There is a disposition to criticize the conduct of Miss

Beckner, upon whose statements to her cousin, Thompson, it is supposed, made the attack on Davis.

NO NEGROES NEEDED ANY.

BALTIMORE, May 2.—Rev. J. A. Reddick, a well-known colored Methodist Episcopal clergyman, of Baltimore, now at Staunton, Virginia, arrived at Baltimore yesterday over the Baltimore & Ohio, and at once made complaint that his rights had been denied him; that he had been ill-treated and ejected from a vacant hotel, at Relay station, owned by the Baltimore & Ohio railroad. He states that when the train arrived at Relay, he went into the hotel with other passengers to his breakfast, but was refused by the managers of the house, who stated that John W. Garrett, president of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, had given orders that colored people should not be served there. The clergyman says that he attempted to communicate with the manager, when the latter became angry and with an oath, put him out of the dining room. Reddick declares that he will have his rights vindicated.
