**SIX DAMAGE SUITS.**

Against a Railroad Company—the First One Tried Yesterday, and is Won by the Plaintiff.

It will be remembered that some time six men were killed in a cut on what is now the Chicago, Minneapolis, St. Paul & Omaha road in Burt county. While they were shoveling snow, a train dashed through the cut and caught them before they could get out of the way. Suits have been brought against the railroad company to recover damages for each man killed. Yesterday the suit of the estate of A. P. Swanson, his late administrator, S. M. Larson, against the railroad, was tried in Burt county before Judge Wakely, the amount of damage being \$5,000, which is the limit allowed by law in such suits. The jury returned a verdict for the plaintiff for the full amount. Tom J. M. Thornton, of Omaha, and Hon. Watson Parton, of Omaha, were the attorneys for the plaintiff, and Hon. John D. Howe represented the defendant. There are five similar suits to be tried—Omaha Republican.

District Judges A. M. Post, of Columbus, Nebraska, passed through this morning, bound for Lincoln. The Judge has been visiting friends in Madison county Iowa.

Alleg. McIntosh received the sad word yesterday, by telegram, that his brother, Mr. Kenneth McIntosh, a prominent lawyer of Pittsburgh, Pa., was not expected to live over Sabbath, (yesterday).
