### THE STRIKE NOT ENDED.

Neither Side Concedes to the Demands of the Other.

TREATING FOR A COMPROMISE.

New York, August 15.—At noon today a committee of six striking operators formerly employed by the Western Union company, waited on General Eckert and asked for an interview, which was granted. It is not known what proposition they have to advance. The committee said they represented the Morse operators and linemen in the employ of the Western Union, but that their call was not to be considered as a weakening on the part of the brotherhood. Their purpose was to inquire on what terms the men would be taken back into service. General Eckert said he would recommend that those now out should apply to their respective superintendents for information as to terms for resumption of work.

THE WESTERN UNION.  
The executive committee of the Western Union met today. Among those present were Jay Gould, Geo. Gould, Russell Sage, Cyrus Field, Harrison Durkee and General Eckert. No reference to the strike. After the meeting an informal conference in regard to the application of the committee of strikers, to General Eckert was held, and they heartily endorsed his action in referring them to their superintendents for information as to terms upon which they will be taken back.

RENEWED VIGOR.  
The executive board of the telegraphers' brotherhood sent a communication to General Eckert stating that "since all our attempts to effect a reconciliation have proved futile, we now desire to state that it is the intention of the brotherhood to ignore your ultimatum, and carry our fight with renewed vigor and determination by every legitimate means in our power."

Hoboken, N. J., Aug. 15.—Nineteen wires of the New Jersey telephone company were cut last night.

### THE FREIGHT BUDGET.

New York Republicans.

REPUBLICAN COMMITTEE.

New York, August 15.—The Republican State committee met today. Six members of the committee were represented by proxies, and three including the dead Pierre C. Van Wyck, were not represented at all. Chairman John F. Smythe presided. Six ballots were taken before a decision was reached as to the place of holding the State convention. Richfield Springs was chosen and September 19. A wigwag will be erected by the hotel keepers for the convention. Pierre Van Wyck's successor will be named by his district committee. Adjourned to meet at Richfield Springs September 18. The meeting was entirely harmonious.—The delegates to the State convention will number 476.

YELLOW FEVER.  
Quebec, August 15.—The Norwegian bark, Panama, for this port, is reported to be coming up the river with yellow fever on board, two deaths having already occurred and others of the crew being down with the disease.

MINE DISASTER.  
London, August 15.—While thirteen men were being hauled to the surface at a mine near the town of Redruth, county Cornwall, today, the rope attached to the car broke, and twelve of the men were precipitated to the bottom of the shaft and instantly killed.

London, August 15.—There are alarming signs of earthquake in Serro, on the island of Ischia. Springs are drying up, and smoke is issuing from fissures in the ground. The minister of public works has issued an order for the immediate erection of huts for the accommodation of the people in case they are compelled to vacate their houses.

DESPERATE DEPOSITORS.  
London, August 15.—A party of depositors in a small savings bank in London, angry at their inability to draw their money on demand, entered the bank and wrecked the premises. The police were called in, but refused to interfere.

ITALIAN CLAIMS.  
Gibraltar, August 15.—The Italian envoy at Angier, Morocco, has lowered the flag in the consulate and the inhabitants are in consequence in a state of great panic. This hostile action on the part of the enemy is on account of the sultan of Morocco not yet having yielded to the ultimatum of Italy, in insisting upon full payment of the claims of Italian subjects. There is an Italian squadron in the harbor in readiness to support the demand on the sultan.

THE CHOLERA.  
Alexandria, August 15.—Deaths here yesterday from cholera, forty.

Calo, August 15.—Nine deaths from cholera in this city yesterday.

THE LABOR QUESTION.  
New York, August 15.—The United States senatorial committee on labor and education continued its inquiry today. John S. McClelland, a telegraph operator, declared that threats were being made by many railroad companies that they would discharge any man found to be a member of the brotherhood. Among others the Michigan Central and Pennsylvania Railroad companies employed this plan. Other means taken by capital to ensnare workmen were cited by the witness. The witness gave a number of statistics showing that strikes of workmen had very generally proven failures.

Philadelphia, August 15.—On invitation of Senator Blair, chairman of the senate sub committee, the Amalgamated association of iron and steel workers at its session today decided to send John Jarrett, Wm. Martin and James Penny to testify before the committee at Washington after the convention adjourns.

### A DAY'S ACCIDENTS.

#### The Coopers in Session.

A COLLISION.  
Charlotte, Mich., August 15.—A collision occurred on the race course here this morning between the trotting animals Raymond and Ranker's Rothschild. Raymond was killed outright, and the other dangerously hurt. Eight thousand had been refused for the dead horse.

TURNED UP.  
Troy, August 15.—Thomas G. Hunt, of New York, a merchant who disappeared mysteriously in June last turned up in Elizabethtown, Essex county. He has not been to Europe and says he doesn't know where he has been.

CRIMINAL CARELESSNESS.  
Troy, August 15.—Lew Johnson, a telegraph operator, charged with the responsibility for the collision on the Troy & Boston railroad whereby six lives were lost was arrested today. He denies the responsibility.

#### THE COOPERS.

Peoria, August 16.—The cooper's convention which has been in session here a few days, adjourned today, having concluded its labors. It was called for the purpose of reorganizing the international union, an association which was formed in Chicago ten years ago and was dissolved after a few years. The last convention was held in 1875. Delegates were here here from all the principal cities in this country and Canada. The proceeding were secret. The reorganization of an aid association or union was affected. It also decided to organize a mutual insurance company, which will increase the membership to at least 10,000. The following officers were elected: President and treasurer, Thomas Hennepin, of Cleveland; secretary, J. B. Lewis, of Peoria; second vice president, P. Egan, of Toronto, Canada, 3d vice president, John J. Long, of Altoon; 4th vice president, James Herdman, of Peoria; fifth vice president, John McGrath, of Cleveland. The convention then adjourned subject to the call of executive committee. The name was changed to the Cooper's Protective association of North America.

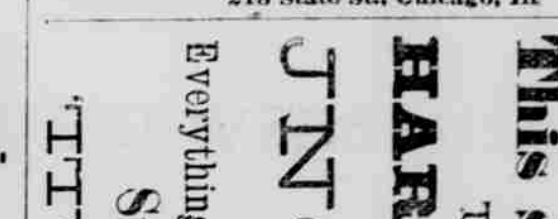
