THE ARMORED KNIGHTS.

The Biggest Conclave Ever Held In America.

The Presidential Party.

Miscellaneous News.

San Francisco, August 30.—The grand Procession of Knights Templar which took place this afternoon, was admitted to be an unequalled success. The entire population of San Francisco and 70,000 strangers have so declared it, cheering throughout the entire route. It was the best represented if not the most numerous convalesce ever held in this or any other country. The people in this city are eminently gratified with the result. They have spared no pains nor expense to return the compliment extended to the representatives of the coast at the Chicago convalesce. As early as 8 o'clock this morning crowds began gathering in the streets along which the procession would pass. By 9 o'clock Market street was rendered impassable, except the roadway, which, by police orders, was kept clear for the passage of the knights. At 9:30 the commanderies began to arrive, taking up the positions assigned them in streets of Market street reserved for the purpose. At 10 o'clock all had arrived, and at that hour the scene presented from the gallery of the Baldwin hotel was one not readily to be forgotten by those who had the good fortune to witness it. On one side were the decorations extending as far as the triumphal arch. On the other 4,000 richly clad knights, representing every state and territory in the United States. So the old California pioneer it was something beyond realization. His mind reverted to the sand hills, and he was dazed. At 10:30 order was given by the captain general to move forward. A platoon of mounted police spurred their horses on to clear the way, followed by a detachment of police on foot. The first commandery that led off was California commandery No. 1. Their silver embroidered velvet cloaks and plumed hats, with richly caparisoned horses, attracted marked attention. Following them came the Golden Gate and Oakland, California, commanderies and Grand Master Governor Sir George Perkins, riding a milk-white charger, specially presented to him for the occasion by Judge Denson, of Sacramento, accompanied by his staff. Next in order came the commanderies of California, Oregon and Washington Territory, Nevada and Arizona, each proceeded by its band. These completed the first three divisions, after which up to the tenth division, came the commanderies of the States east of the Rocky mountains. Among the latter, particularly remarked from the smallness of numbers and their pluck in coming, was the Arkansas Demolais, of Ft. Smith, No. 1, Hartford Damascus, No. 2, of Jacksonville, Florida, and Crewe No. 8, of Middletown, Connecticut. The approach of Lyon & Healy's band, of Chicago, with their striking uniform, made every one ask, who are these knights coming? They were the St. Bernard's of Chicago, who by the knights of this coast, are held in especial esteem. As they passed by, the knowledge of what they were, and the appearance they made elicited long and hearty cheers. The tenth and last division was composed of the grand encampment of the United States, led by Sir Wm. Knox, past grand commander, of California. The royal band selected by the grand commandery of this state as the official orchestra of the convalesce immediately preceded the Boston commandery, which acted as a special escort to the Grand Master of the United States Dean. The Bostonians were highly complimented on their excellent appearance, cheer after cheer being given them as they passed. Following on while charges, came the convalesce grand master, accompanied by a numerous and brilliant staff. The procession terminated with De Witt and Clinton commanderies, of Virginia City, Nevada, mounted on black steeds, and acting as a guard of honor, to the grand encampment. The Virginians merited compliment in dress, horses and accoutrements. It was generally acknowledged that they bore off the honors of the day. The knights first proceeded to the pavilion, where addresses were delivered by Governor Stoneman of California, ex-Governor Perkins, the mayor of the city and others. They then marched to Vannas avenue where they were received by the grand master.

Another day's sport for the President.
Camp Teton, August 18, via Washakie, Wyoming, Aug. 20.—Promptly at half past six this morning we mounted our horses, and not without longing looks behind rode away from the camp. Our course was in a westerly direction along the north side of the Grosventre

river. The air was clear and bracing, and the day as fine as any with which we have been favored since we set out from Fort Washakie. The trail was of the best, with few of those difficulties with which our fortnight's travel in the wilderness has made us so familiar. Indeed, in the absence of fallen timber, rocky side hills, steep ascents and pitches, the ride would have seemed somewhat monotonous, but for the single feature which actually glorified it. We had climbed to the summit of a long hill five miles from Camp Arthur, when there suddenly burst upon our view a scene as grand and majestic as we ever witnessed. Below covered with grass and flowers, was a lovely valley of many miles extent, through which was threading its way, the river. Along the whole westerly edge of the valley, with no intervening foot hills to obstruct the view, toward the magnificent Teton mountains, their snowy summits piercing the fleecy clouds 8,000 feet above the level of the sea. It was the voice of every member of the party that this sight alone fully repaid all the toils of the march. We are encamped on the Teton basin, on the bank of Grosventre. The locality, aside from the splendid view of the mountains which it affords, is one of the most attractive camps. The river at this point has an excellent reputation as a trout stream, but the wind has been blowing at too many miles an hour to permit much success in angling. It has been powerful enough to break the ridge pole of our mess tent, but fortunately not beyond repair. We are all in excellent health and are thoroughly enjoying the trip.

CONCLAVE CASUALTIES.
San Francisco, August 30.—Several accidents are reported in the convalesce procession today. Three standard-bearers fainted from exhaustion, and Sir Alexander Weed, Commander of California, was thrown from his horse and had both legs broken.

ROAD COMPLETED.
The Secretary of the Interior was today informed that a section of seventy-five miles of the Northern Pacific Road, uniting the two ends, near Minid tunnel, had been completed, and the company has requested the appointment of a commissioner to examine and report on this section of road.

A COSTLY FIRE.
Trenton, N. J., August 30.—A dispatch from Lambertville, says McDowd & Son's large paper mill at that place was almost entirely destroyed by fire yesterday morning. The loss will probably exceed \$50,000; insurance about \$10,000. Forty men are thrown out of employment.

IRISH MEMBERS' LANGUAGE.

AN ALLIANCE.
Madrid, August 20.—Madrid newspapers are discussing the expediency of forming an alliance between Spain, Austria and Germany in order to check the influence of French democracy in Spanish politics.

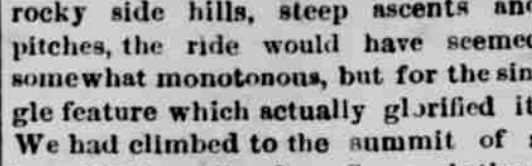
CETEWAYO'S PLEA.

CANADIAN STORMS.
Toronto, August 20.—A terrific storm, accompanied by thunder and lightning, visited the northwest part of Ontario yesterday. At Listwell the water is two feet in the streets. Several buildings and bridges were carried away, and the destruction to property generally is very great. At Windham the river rose twelve feet. The railroad bridge and track were washed away, and the country road is covered with four feet of water. A large quantity of standing grain was destroyed.

BAD FOR EGYPT.
London, August 20.—A Times Alexandria correspondent says: If the British troops should be withdrawn from Egypt no European family would remain in the country a week after their departure. Egypt, he states, is incapable of self-government.
