Frost Fortunately Fails to Appear.

Secretary Folger on the Lottery Business.

Railroad Notes and Other Miscellany.

NO FROST.

Chicago, Sept. 22.—The signal service predictions were for frost Friday and Saturday nights throughout the northern States. At midnight last night the Associated press received reports from all points in the above named territory, but none of these despatches reported frost. Tonight representatives of the Associated press in the same sections of country were ordered to send reports provided frost occurred, not otherwise. Up to one o'clock nothing is received, and it is presumed that frost has not been noticed within the danger limit.

Cleveland, Sept. 23.—Reports from the following places in northern Ohio say there was no frost last night: Warren, Painesville, Ashtabula, Jefferson, Chardon, Ravenna, Medina, Akron, Youngstown, Tiffin, Sandusky, Norwalk and Fremont.

St. Paul, Sept. 23.—Reports from the following places in Dakota say there was no frost last night: Fargo, Bismarck, Jamestown, Huron, Pierre, Grand Forks and Mitchell. Duluth and Fergus Falls, Minnesota, also report no frosts.

THAT FROST PREDICTION.

Chicago, Sept. 22.—The following explanation in regard to the somewhat sensational signal service bulletin posted on the board of trade Friday morning predicting frost all north of the Tennessee that night, and which caused a decided flurry in corn reaches this city from Washington: There were more or less defined indications of frost in the territory mentioned, and the chief signal officer, not desiring to create a panic or disturb values, appended a foot note to the usual bulletin, addressed as a private message to the observers at Chicago and several other important cities, warning them not to give too wide publicity to the fact, as they appeared from the report to be by mistake. The bulletin was not given out here, while the private note to observers did all the mischief, and was posted on 'Change. The failure of the fulfillment of the prediction was a very general theme of conversation among members of the board today, who were not aware of this explanation.

THE LOTTERY WAR.

The president of the New Orleans National bank, against which Postmaster General Gresham's recent order relating to the lottery company's mail matter was directed, had an interview with the secretary of the treasury on the subject. Secretary Folger told him that the question of the delivery of mail matter to the bank was one over which he had no direct control, that being under the jurisdiction of the post office department. The only question, he said, which he, Secretary Folger, had to decide was whether the action of the bank in becoming the agent of the lottery company, to receive its mail, was a proper subject for investigation by the treasury department.

ST. LOUIS FAIR.

St. Louis, Sept. 22.—Preparations for fair week have begun on a great scale. The fair opens October 1, and continues throughout the week. A grand display of fire works, and a pageant of twenty-two floats, illustrating the "fairy land," are a portion of the programme. Also a trades pageant, in which there will be over 100 specially prepared floats representing the business interests of the city.

FUN IN MASSACHUSETTS.

Boston, Sept. 21.—The dramatic cactus tonight in the Twenty-second ward broke up in a free fight, and in the third ward there was a bolt. All delegates elected are for Butler.

WANT ANOTHER LINE.

Portland, Oregon, Sept. 22.—The Astoria chamber of commerce telegraphed Villard, president of the Northern Pacific railroad, asking if he would build the Astoria & Forest Grove railroad, provided they found a contractor to take it for \$30,000 a mile and they to furnish the terminal facilities at Astoria. Villard replied that he would

build the line, if the contractor would take it for \$20,000 per mile, payable in first mortgage bonds, and \$10,000 a mile in second mortgage bonds which was all the available funds the company had at present.

THE RATE WAR.

Chicago, Sept. 22.—No change occurred today in the passenger rate war between Chicago and Louisville. The rate remains \$1.

THE IOWA CAMPAIGN.

Chicago, Sept. 22.—The political campaign in Iowa is being conducted with unusual vigor this fall. It is outlined as prohibition and a protective tariff on the side of the republicans, and license and tariff for revenue on the side of the democrats. They are calling some of the strongest men into the campaign. Ben Harrison has been on the stump for the republicans, Governor Hendricks for the democrats, and Congressman Wm. M. Springer, of Illinois; is in the city today on his way to that state where he will begin Monday a series of speeches lasting till time of the election.

THE YELLOW FEVER.

Guaymas, Sept. 22.—Nine deaths from yellow fever have been reported in the last twenty-four hours. The thermometer has again risen to ninety-seven. Fears are again entertained that under the great heat and filthy condition of the streets it will again increase and spread. Eleven new cases were reported yesterday. Not enough rain fell to clean the streets, and the hot sun following has tended to increase the malaria. The alarming increase in deaths and new cases has driven the people almost frantic, not knowing whether they should flee from the city or remain in the hope that the worst is passed. The members of the board of health have proved themselves entirely incompetent to deal with the matter.

It is rumored that Del Valle, a millionaire of this city, who fled to the country, has died. No news from Havana.

Havana, Sept. 22.—Twelve deaths from yellow fever here during the past week.

LATEST NEWS ON RATES.

Chicago, Sept. 23.—The war on passenger rates between Chicago and Louisville will take a broader range tomorrow, and in view of the new points to be included, it is believed that a number of other lines than the Pan Handle to Louisville, New Albany and Chicago must be drawn into it, and it is impossible to say where they will stop. The Louisville, New Albany & Chicago will commence in the morning, running via the A. Line a solid train, including palace and Pullman cars, on a schedule of one hour shorter time than trains are now making between Chicago and that point, and the fare will be put at \$1 which is a cut of four dollars and fifty cents on regular rate. Hereafter trains will be run on this rate at 8:00 in the morning, 5:00 evening, running via Cincinnati, Hamilton, and Dayton, and will also sell tickets to leading points in competition with the Pan Handle at the following rates: Cincinnati \$4.50, Columbus \$6.40, Dayton \$4.30, Springfield \$5.00, Urbana \$5.20. The regular rate to Cincinnati is \$8.65, which makes a cut of \$4.35, and the cut to other points named in about the same proportion. Officers of the road say thus far they have been on the defensive in the fight, merely meeting the cuts by the Pan Handle, but for the future they propose to make an aggressive warfare till the trouble is ended.
