The president of the New Orleans National bank, against which Postmaster General Gresham's recent order relating to the lottery company's mail matter was directed, had an interview with the secretary of the treasury on the subject. Secretary Folger told qim that the question of the delivery of mail matter to the bank was one over which he had no direct control, that being under the jurisdiction of the post office department. The only question, he said, which he Secretary Folger, had to decide was whether the action of the bank in becoming the agent of the lottery company, to receive its mail, was a proper subject for investigation by the treasury department.
