SICHT-SEEING IN THE WEST.

The B. & M. Band's Excursion to

Denver and the Rockies.

CONCLUDED. As mentioned in my previous letter, the last day of our visit was devoted to a trip up the mountains, to Georgetown, and this was by far the most in-

on Sunday, the 16th inst. During the summer months excursion trains leave Denver every Sunday over both the D. & R. G. and Colorado Central roads, the former destined southward for Colorado Springs, Manitou, Pueblo, etc., and the latter through the mountains westward for Idaho Springs and Georgetown. We chose this route, as it promised to afford us greater scope of scenery and a bracing mountain breeze. The readers of the HERALD will probably censure us for our seeming violation of the Lord's day in the pursuit of pleasure; but allow me to assert that perhaps a day could not have been much better spent by a novice in the realistic beauties of nature, than by witnessing the great works of the Creator displayed on all sides in that far-famed country, and evidently praising the great author of all the wonders. To each and all of us it seemed nothing less than a holy Sabbath, and the repeated ejaculations of

A long train of cars left Denver at 8 a. m., consisting mostly of observation cars, especially adapted to facilitate sight seeing, over a narrow gauge of particular interest occurred as we passed over the vast plain between Denver and the foot-hills of the Rocky mountains, until we reached Golden. noted for its great smelting works, and beautifully situated at the base of the mountains, immediately west of the oot hills. Here another engine was at shed to the rear end of the train, and y we thundered to the mouth of

sincerity of our feelings.

C ar Creek canon, where we entered the mountain, and commenched "snak ing" upward toward the summit. I use the word "snaking" advisedly, for such another twisting of the road bed between the mountain sides is seldom seen. Sometimes on one and then on the other side of the rapidly rolling stream, now and then around the sharpsst of curves, up, up, we go, along the clearest of streams, the mountain sides with the occipital bone of our craniums faced from our memories. constantly resting on the spinal vertebræ, and wondering why that heavy mass of solid rock does not come thundering down into the narrow valley below. We see an endless array of great boulders, piled up promiscuously on either side, and in such variety of that some great eruption of nature had | valley. at one time upheaved this ponderous mass and left it in the pell-mell condi tion it now presents to view. Then again we wonder at the awe inspiring sight of "Mother Grundy," a place where a vast amount of rock had to be cut away to make room for the roadbed, leaving the mountain side very the sky, overhanging the track below, with his relatives here. the curiously formed picture of a face belonging to that class of females, clearly defines itself against the azure blue beyond. Again we gaze upon the mountain firs, stunted cedars, and here and there the patches of shrubbery, seemingly growing out of and shooting up through the fissures of those immense boulders, and wondering what today. cau-es them to grow. In fact, it is a succession of wonders, and we almost

wished the trip would never end. Beaver Brook, a small wayside station. failed to learn. but picturesquely situated, was passed, and we reached Idaho Springs, a town of no mean pretensions as to size, cosily situated between the mountain sides, in a neat plain of some dimensions. Here many of the excursionists left the train to spend the hours until return time, in that interesting locality, and leaving us to pursue our way onward and up-

Green Lake, the resort of so many visitors, is a remarkable sheet of wat-

er, as clear as a crystal, every -object being plainly visible at a depth of 25 feet or more, assuming towards the middle a bottle green aspect, indicating great depth. The Garden of the Gods, in which this lake is situated, presents many peculiar features, not the least being the interesting small mounds of rocks studded here and there over the plain, and the small patches of snow in teresting part of our trip-occurring the declivities of the earth,

The second party ascended the mountain road north of Georgetown, also on toot, and though not reaching so high an altitude, they had, nevertheless, an Neb. equally interesting trip. When about 900 feet up, we took a view of that city, far do wn below our feet and then One Thousand Bottles of Marsh's Golcould notice how compactly it is built. presenting a dense mass of buildings, many of them substantial structures, narrow streets, and seemingly every mch of ground built over that could be made available for that purpose. Near by we visited the Lebanon mine owned by a New York company, and classed as the best paying silver mine track, behind one of the peculiarly in that part of the county. This mine built engines of such roads. Jothing has been explored in a straight line for a distance of 3,234 feet, and has four side tunnels. Lighting a candle, which was kindly turnished us, we groped our way into the darkness beyond, for a distance of about 1,400 feet, until reaching a side tunnel, where work was in progress, we proceeded to look for the precious ore, and succeeded in curing several small samples.

The time drawing nigh for our de parturé we hastily retraced our steps towards the outer world, and reached Georgetown in due time for the return train, reaching Denver at 8 p. m., and giving us ample time to get ready for our return home over the B. & M.
