HON. J. H. BROADY has been chosen as the standard bearer of the anti-monopoly party as well as of the democratic party in the First Judicial district. We never thought our old friend Broady was cut out for an anti-monopoly leader, and we don't think he looks well at the head of that ticket. The moss upon the back of "The little giant" will never be mistaken for hayseed down in the First Judicial.

The main grievance Ben Butler seems to have against the republican party of Massachusetts is the refusal of the last legislature to allow the old man to run that co-ordinate branch of the state government; he quaintly remarked to the democratic convention which placed him in nomination, that the last legislature refused to adopt the suggestions he (Butler) made to them as governor of the state; hence, Old Ben concludes "the rascals" should be turned out. Ben F. Butler places his grievance upon the right ground and the issue is squarely and sharply defined; it is, shall old Ben run the machine? or shall the people manage their own affairs down the reef?

CHIEF JUSTICE COLERIDGE has been entertained by the Chicago people for the past two or three days, a portion of the time, he was the guest of Emory A. Storrs, and was entertained in a hospitable, generous manner by the City of the Lakes. The great Chief Justice shows himself to be practical, sensible man, and has evidently visited this country for the purpose of learning all about our system of government and manners of life. It appears this distinguished man is making a leisurely tour of the country, especially of our principal cities, and is proving himself to be willing and anxious to make the acquaintance of our people wherever he goes.

Proprietorship in American politics is a very pleasant yet dangerous hallucination with which the individual, in power, often felicitates himself.

A sudden elevation to a brief office should vest no proprietary rights in the fortunate individual (who has perhaps happened upon such office) to the balance of the political goods and chattels lying around loose in his immediate neighborhood. If our present delegation in congress will but cast about them and glance at the unfortunate careers (political) of a majority of Nebraska's public men who "have gone the way of all the earth" they will be enabled to gather wisdom from which they can profit, by avoiding the shoals upon which so many unfortunate barks have gone to pieces.

There is nothing which so justly arouses the righteous indignation of the masses as this disposition to meddle with, and thwart the will of the people by an individual who happens to be clothed with a little brief authority and especially is this the case when that individual assumes to direct, and dictate to the masses, upon the ground that he has a right to exercise the power conferred upon him by virtue of his office, to build up his own selfish fortunes, regardless of the will or desire of his constituents.

It is an evidence of weakness upon the part of the public man who adopts such a policy, a self confession that he feels that he is too weak to stand alone. The public men who have long remained in power in our American Congress have been noted for their contempt for this branch of politics; and we find it is the one term fellows, who have attempted to control public affairs through the exercise of a political legerdemain, rather than through the influence of meritorious services rendered the public and weight of character.

The individual who attempts at this day to perpetuate himself in power and office, by intricate and dictatorial measures, is certain to shortly find himself called to a reckoning. If a man wishes to run the political machine without the aid of the people he should keep the matter a profound secret.

TAKING THEIR OWN MEDICINE.

From the Interior Ocean. The professional civil-service reformers do not appear to realize the force of the old adage that "what is sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander." They are fond of introducing resolutions at political meetings of waiting tracts and editorials, and making speeches lamenting the pernicious custom of appointing and promoting favorites, and denouncing "the spoils system," but whenever they happen to seek official ambition they suspend the rules with promptness and dispatch. There is a case in the New York Custom House just now which illustrates what wry faces doctors make when required to take their own medicine.

The Collector of New York, Judge Robertson, is a famous reformer, and George William Curtis is another. Competitive examination and the promotion of the fittest; regardless of personal allegiance or political service is their particular hobby, and they have spent a great part of their lives in abusing President Arthur, and opposing his political advancement because he is, or has been, the representative of "the spoils system." These gentlemen happen to have a personal friend and favorite in Mr. F. H. Wight, Chief of the New York Custom House, and, the position of Deputy Collector being vacant, Mr. Robertson immediately promoted him to the vacancy, and, as the law required, sent the appointment to Washington for approval. Secretary Folger, acting under the instructions of the President, sent the papers back to Robertson, informing him that the Civil Service Commission would attend to the case, and an examination be made into the merits of persons who desired to be made Deputy Collectors, in which Mr. Wight might take his chances with the rest. This did not please Mr. Robertson, who, with Mr. George William Curtis, has been engaged for some time in a controversy with the Secretary of the Treasury, insisting that Mr. Wight should have the place without competing for it. But the President is inexorable, and the friend of the reformers must prepare to be quizzed.

These gentlemen have for years been demanding just such a rule as they now want to violate. In season and out of season have they argued that there was no other way to protect the rights of faithful officials and secure a moral service. But the very first time the rule is enacted, to use a vulgar but forcible expression, they "kick." They want the sauce administered to the goose, and the ganders made exceptions. And it is worth while to say right here, that those who have been designated as machine politicians, those who have been accused of advancing and encouraging the spoils system in the Republican party, have not resisted or attempted to interfere with the Civil Service Reform Commission in any way. They are willing the experiment of making appointment after competitive examination should have a fair and thorough trial, and if it is found to improve the service are willing to make it permanent.

The following from the Ashland Gazette shows the manner in which Judge Reese's nomination is received at home:

Reese in Saunders county will be glad to learn that the republican convention at Lincoln in its wisdom saw fit to select that gentleman as the candidate of that party for supreme judge. 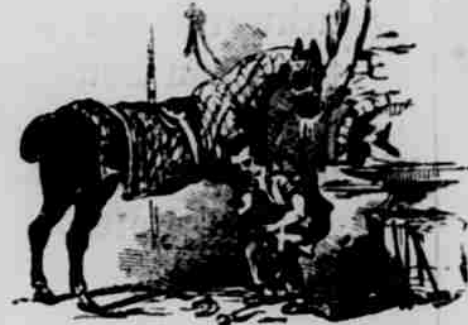
