**GENERAL NEWS.**  
 Dallas, Texas, Almost Destroyed by Fire.  
 Tilden and Hendrick's Stock on the up Grade.  
 Passenger Rates and Other Matters of Interest.

**THE DALLAS CONFLAGRATION.**  
 Kansas City, Oct. 6. A dispatch from Dallas, Texas, says a terrible conflagration is raging there in the elevator and cotton press district. About ninety buildings are already on fire. The fire started at noon in the engine room of the elevator on Elm street. The building was soon in flames, which communicated to the large quantity of cotton stored near, and under the high wind the fire spread through the entire district. At 5 o'clock the fire was still raging. A fire engine from Ft. Worth is here and with the two Dallas engines is playing on the flames. Crowds are running, and excitement is unabated. It is impossible to estimate the loss, but it will amount to hundreds of thousands.

In the portion of the elevator where the fire started was stored 8,000 bales of cotton. In a short time the whole building was a mass of flames. The large compress opposite the elevator, was on fire at least five times, but was as often extinguished. At one o'clock the flames leaped the walls of the warehouse on the north side of Graced avenue, and burned an entire block, composed of the electric light manufactory a livery stable, wagon yard and grocery store. At Colton street it crossed Lamar and burned three residences and several small business houses. At one o'clock Mayor Cabell telegraphed to Ft. Worth for help. In an hour they were at Dallas and at work. The fire was gotten under control at 5 o'clock at Colton street, having burned three and a half blocks. Loss estimated at \$400,000. It is impossible to give the insurance. The elevator was owned by a company of New Orleans, with John T. Hardie, president.

Later—At ten p. m. the cotton is still burning. Three engines are playing on it. That in the warehouse will be a complete loss. Some at the compress will be saved. The elevator was filled with grain which is a total loss. The insurance is about \$150,000. No one was hurt, though thousands of people thronged the street.

**PASSENGER RATES.**  
 Chicago, October 6.—The general passenger agents of the Ohio River passenger pool met at the Grand Pacific his afternoon. An agreement was arrived at regarding the maintaining of rates between Chicago and the many intermediate points other than Indianapolis. The meeting this afternoon, therefore, did not accomplish as much as it was hoped it would, and adjourned to meet at Louisville, Monday next.

**TILDEN AND HENDRICKS.**  
 Minneapolis, Oct. 6.—The Minneapolis Tribune will publish tomorrow a dispatch from an authoritative quarter to the following effect: Despite the many assertions said to be made on authority from Greystone that Tilden would under no circumstances consent to be the presidential candidate of the democratic party in 1884, it may be safely set down that a desperate effort will be made to nominate the old ticket, with the full knowledge and consent of the two gentlemen most directly interested. A short time ago Hendricks made a quiet visit to Tilden, and effected an adjustment of the difficulty between them since the campaign of 1876, after which he exposed the real object of his visit by trying to induce Tilden to allow his name to go before the national convention. After extended conversation in which the many objections advanced by Tilden were met and satisfactorily answered by Hendricks, Tilden said: "Well, I shudn't mind it except for the labor of making another campaign." To which Hendricks replied, assuring Tilden that the campaign was already made, and he had but to speak the word to secure the nomination. This seemed to satisfy Tilden, and they parted with a full understanding that the old ticket would be put before the people in 1884. Shortly after Mr. Hendricks' visit John Kelly made a journey to Greystone on the same business, presumably on a hint dropped by Hendricks. Kelly assured Tilden that he had buried the hatchet, and was anxious to see the old ticket nominated, and would work hard and faithfully to accomplish that end, also to secure their election. It is intimated that Hendricks was actuated by the fact that Tilden is an old man, and decidedly feeble, and Hendricks would have much to do of the work of the presidential office and would probably become president before the end of the term, by reason of Tilden's feeble condition.

**NICKERSON HEARD FROM.**  
 Washington, Oct. 6.—The whereabouts of the notorious Major Nickerson has been ascertained. He is residing in Thorold, Canada. Upon this information being received, the secretary of war ordered him to proceed at once to Washington, and report in person. An answer was received from him yesterday, in which he declined to obey orders. He defies the authorities, feeling sure he cannot be extradited. Further action will be taken in the matter, but in all probability he will be dropped from the army as a deserter. He has reported a false address to the department, disobeyed General Sherman's orders not to leave Washington, and now refuses to obey the secretary's orders.

It is the intention to have all under roof by winter.
