A Close Battle in Ohio Today, in which Ladies Participate.
Railroad and Washington Notes.

NORTHERN PACIFIC BONDS,
New York, Oct. 8.—It is understood that \$19,000,000 of new Northern Pacific second mortgage bonds have been taken, as follows: Winslow, Lanier & Co., \$4,000,000; Drexel, Morgan & Co., \$4,000,000; August Belmont, \$4,000,000; Jay Gould, \$3,000,000; Kueser Sage, \$2,000,000; D. O. Mills, \$2,000,000; G. M. Putnam, \$1,000,000.
MORTGAGE BONDS.
Denver, Col., Oct. 8.—A special meeting of the stockholders of the Denver & Rio Grande railroad company was held at Colorado Springs today. A resolution was unanimously passed authorizing the creation of general mortgage bonds for \$50,000,000, which shall run thirty years, bear five per cent interest, and the issue shall never exceed \$30,000,000 per mile outstanding, including all prior mortgages, and only on finished road. Three-fourths of the entire stock was represented at the meeting.

THE OHIO RIVER POOL.
Louisville, Oct. 8.—The executive committee of the new Ohio river pool is in session at the Gault House perfecting and ratifying the arrangements to be made at the previous meetings in Cincinnati and Chicago to fix rates between Chicago and Ohio river points. They were in secret sessions and the outcome of the meeting it is possible to ascertain. The proceedings are harmonious, and before adjournment they will doubtless effect a traffic contract. It is said, however, that the Chicago & Eastern Illinois people are opposed to the pool. Should the meeting not come to a satisfactory agreement it is rumored that one of the roads involved will cut tomorrow.
TOUR OF INSPECTION.
Washington, Oct. 8.—Gen. Sherman and Gen. Tidball, who have been on a tour of inspection and observation of military posts in the far west, returned to Washington this morning, and resumed their duties. They have been away from the city one hundred and ten days, and in that time traveled 10,708 miles. Gen. Sherman will attend the reunion of the society of the Army of the Tennessee at Cleveland, on the 7th and 18th inst., after which he will return to the city and close up the affairs of his office, so Lieutenant General Sheridan may be fully instructed before the meeting of congress.

EDISON BEATEN.
The commissioner of patents overruled the board of examiners-in-chief, and reversed their decision in the case of Sawyer & Mann vs. Edison, involving the priority of invention of an incandescent conductor for the electric lamp, formed of carbonized paper. The priority of invention is awarded Sawyer & Mann, who, it is held in the decision, completed their invention at least a year in advance of Edison.
SUPREME COURT
adjourned without transacting any business of importance.
General Dent has asked to be placed on the retired list December 1, under the forty service provision.
NO BUSINESS DONE.
Washington, Oct. 8.—The supreme court of the United States convened today, but without transacting any business of consequence, a adjourned until tomorrow. All the justices were present. There was the usual attendance of members of the bar. These cases in which the rules go to show that the causes were returnable today, will come before the court tomorrow. The legal tender case Junnard against Greenman, which stands number nine on the docket and which was probably reached tomorrow or Wednesday, will not be argued at present. It is understood a motion will be made to assign it to some later day in the term.
MINOR MENTION.
Secretary Lincoln has returned from Ohio. Internal revenue commissioner, Walter Evans, left for Louisville tonight. The navy department has been informed that Capt. N. L. Oakes, of the marine corps, died at Corinto yesterday of heart disease.
The President has accepted two sections of Northern Pacific railroad, one seventy-five miles in Montana, and the other thirty-six miles from the Columbia river to Portland.

A DENIAL.
A cable message was received at the department of state today from Consul General Lenny stating that quiet prevailed in Cannon, and that there is no truth in the reported assassination of United States Consul Seymour, who is

alive and well. This telegram was received in reply to one sent by the acting secretary of state yesterday morning, asking for information on the subject.
YELLOW FEVER.
Washington, Oct. 8.—Surgeon Finney, in charge of the quarantine station at Ship Island, reports that for the week ending September 29 there were eleven cases of yellow fever and three deaths. Advances from Pensacola report three new cases of yellow fever at the navy yard, and one new case and one death on the reservation. The weather has been intensely hot.
DIFFERENCES OF OPINION.
Des Moines, Ia., Oct. 8.—The republican state central committee tonight claim the state, and that Sherman will have fifteen thousand majority over Weaver and Kinne and three thousand over Kinne alone. They have twenty of the twenty-one hold over senators and will elect nineteen senators and sixty-seven members of the house, which will give them sixty-two majority on joint ballot. They only concede forty-four members of both houses to the opposition. The democratic state central committee tonight claim that Kinne will have twelve thousand majority over Sherman, and Hayes, for judge of the supreme court will probably run five thousand less, and that the legislature will be democratic and greenback by from five to seven majority on joint ballot.

THE FEMALE POLITICIANS.
Cleveland, Oct. 9.—The Woman's Christian Temperance union has rented store rooms, and in some cases entire dwellings in close proximity to voting places in every ward in this city for headquarters at the election tomorrow. These places will be decorated with flowers, banners and mottoes. Hot coffee and cakes will be served, and men employed to peddle tickets of both parties with affirmatives for the second or prohibition amendment to the constitution. The ladies themselves will peddle tickets and electioneer for the amendment. The most earnest and shrewdest work of this political campaign has been done by and for the Woman's Christian Temperance union for this amendment.

THE BRITISH GRAIN TRADE.
London, Oct. 8.—The Mark Lane Express, in its review of the British grain trade, says the rain and wind the past week have injured outstanding portions of the harvests in some districts. Trade in London is depressed by the enormous stock of foreign wheat. Trade in foreign wheat off coast is dull. Cargoes inanimate; five arrivals, five sales and six withdrawals. Sales of English wheat during the week, 80,019 quarters, at 49s. 2d per quarter, against 57,266 quarters, at 39s. 6d per quarter, for the corresponding week last year.
TODAY'S CONTEST.
Cincinnati, Oct. 8.—The election in Ohio tomorrow is for state officers and the legislature. There will also be three amendments to the constitution voted on, one to change the judiciary system, one to regulate the liquor traffic, and one to prohibit it. The last two named have assumed a leading place in the issues of the campaign, and in the reports on the result they will be included, showing what portion of the total vote for governor each has.
