AS to democracy yesterday—the day was cold.

If Kinne had as many votes, as months, the campaign in Iowa would not have been so overpowering.

The democrats should hold fast to the old ticket. The older the better; Seymour and Blair, for instance.

For president in 1884, a republican for vice president, in 1884, a republican, so says Ohio, so says the nation.

Iowa democrats are now gathering themselves together to see what a precious few of them there is when it comes to election.

MR. J. STERLING MORTON will now have opportunity to devote a little time to the "non-partisan" election the democrats purpose holding in Nebraska this fall.

Gov. J. Sterling Morton, of Arbor Springs Lodge, O. e. county, Nebraska, who believes government is a sort of free and easy compact of citizens, who is a member of the Golden Club, and who is an educated antimooner at the expense of the C. B. & Q. R. R., has been in Iowa. That state has given 40,000 republican majority; volumes could say no more.

RETURNS from Ohio, which are meagre, indicate that the state is very close the estimates are based upon the vote of last year, when the democracy carried that state by over 19,000. The vote thrown yesterday was very heavy, and returns so far are from the centres of population, where the liquor interest maintain its greatest strength. There seems to be but little doubt at this writing but that the republicans have carried the legislature, and also there seems to be a fair prospect that the amendment prohibiting the liquor traffic, has also received a majority of the votes cast. Taking it all in all, with the liquor question upon their hands, the republicans of Iowa and Ohio have demonstrated the fact that democracy need look for no comfort from either of those states in the coming presidential contest.

THE bigoted determination and religious fanaticism of the Mormons appear in the following report of speeches made at their recent annual conference at Salt Lake City:

Herbert J. Grant, one of the new apostles appointed last year, followed Taylor, and zealously advocated polygamy and tithing. He said after the passage of the Edmunds law, polygamists professing to be good Latter-day Saints had put away their wives and sent them to their mothers. He had an utter contempt for such men. He had more respect for a Gentile or Methodist, avowed enemies, than he had for a Latter-day Saint, frightened by a law passed by Congress. Such a man should be prosecuted. The young apostle appeared to be ignorant of the act that John Taylor, President of the Church, was the first to send his wives away after the passage of the law, and did not call them together until the church concluded to test its constitutionality.

Brigham Young, Jr., followed, stating the powers of darkness were strengthening to overthrow the Church of God, that there never was a time when they so needed the power of the Spirit, but no power on earth could overthrow the saints, and stronger revelations than those they had received were yet to come.

George Q. Cannon spoke in the same strain, and said nothing but the Spirit of God is sufficient to give them wisdom to guide them. God had rescued them from impending danger several times within the past six months. He spoke of the growth of the church and the general temples being built in the Territory, and God was providing plans to preserve the saints. The apostles now said all the powers of heaven and hell could not prevail against the saints, and they would go on prospering.

**OHIO AND IOWA.**

The election returns from Ohio and Iowa are meagre. A heavy storm is raging east of the Mississippi and the wires are in very poor condition. From returns received up to 2 p. m. we conclude it is conclusive for the Republicans.

have carried Ohio by from 10,000 to 12,000 majority, with a fair prospect of a working majority in the Legislature that will insure the election of a republican successor to George H. Pendleton in the United States Senate. Iowa has rolled up 30,000 majority for Governor Sherman and the other candidates on the state ticket, except Judge Reed, who has fallen 5,000 to 6,000 behind his ticket. The Iowa legislature will be nearly to thirds republican, which virtually insures a third term for William B. Allison in the United States Senate. The prohibition issue has complicated results in both states, and returns so far show almost as heavy a vote as in the last Presidential election.—Omaha Bee.

**DOWN TO THE FRONT.**

"The old guard never surrenders." For twenty years and upwards the republican party has been in power in Iowa. During these years the State has prospered immeasurably. It has the most complete system of public schools, the finest public buildings, not a dollar's State indebtedness, and a record of not a dollar stolen or embezzled from the State in all these years. The republicans of Iowa, assisted by a constitutional amendment prohibiting the liquor traffic in that State. The democrats of the State have this year fought what many of them supported a year ago. They were fairly and squarely routed, and the returns as they come in show that the State has gone at least forty thousand republican; that the old line party that has held sway in Iowa is still in the fore; that the democratic party with its false pretensions, false positions, and false doctrines, has been dismissed from public notice, while the republican party of that State with its policy of no debts, no traffic in liquor, and protected industries at home, will move on in that line of progress that makes a school house on every hill a genuine reality.
