### Council Proceedings.

Council met in regular session—all members present.

Minutes read and approved. The accounts against the city, clerk's report and treasurer's report were referred to the committee on finance.

The following accounts were then allowed on the different funds:

W. F. Morrison, \$3.00; A. McFairfield, \$1.25; W. J. White, \$275; J. Gorell, \$11.25; P. McCann, \$14.00.

Mr. Fairfield moved the bill of Mrs. McLaughlin be referred to committee on claims to report at next meeting. Carried.

Other bills in dispute were referred back to the necessary parties for correction.

Mr. Morrison moved that the committee on fire and water make estimate of the cost of three cisterns, and report at next meeting.

Mr. Fairfield, from committee on streets, alleys and bridges, reported new work and repairs necessary in different parts of the city, and the work was ordered done.

Mr. Greusel moved that the amount reported on bill of H. A. Waterman & Son, in dispute, be paid. Mr. Roberts moved to amend, that the bill in full be paid, which amendment carried.

Mr. Roberts moved that crossing on Vine and Sixth be repaired. Carried. The claim of Thos. Mitchell for damages against the city was called up, and after numerous motions a vote was reached and the claim was rejected.

Petition of John Bons regarding certain taxes was referred to committee on claims. In the matter of supplies for police judge, the clerk was ordered to secure them.

Bids for city printing as filed with clerk were opened and read and referred to a committee of three to ascertain which is the lowest bid and report. Committee appointed—Fairfield, Bons and Morrison. After which council adjourned. J. D. SIMPSON, City Clerk.

### Fire.

Shortly after ten o'clock last night, the cry of fire was raised on Main street and it was at once discovered to be in the barn of Maj. Wheeler in the rear of his property on Main street. The fire bell clanged out the alarm, one of the church bells also rang out the warning, and soon an immense concourse of people were on the ground in the immediate vicinity, watching the fire, which had complete control and soon reduced the building to ashes. There was not a breath of wind, and none of the adjoining property was subjected to danger. Parties who arrived early on the ground rescued the cow from the building, and carried carefully to a safe place three stoves that were stored in the barn, so there was no loss except the building and some grain in the crib adjoining. The work is without doubt that of an incendiary, with no idea as to the motive in the case. We learn that there was some insurance on the burned building, so the loss to Major Wheeler will not be a total one. The fire, as a whole, was certainly a fortunate one, located as it was in the centre of the city.

### Briggs' Boston Operatic Minstrels.

### MEMORIAL DAY.

Programme of Exercises for McConihie Post G. A. R.

Head-quarters McConihie Post, No. 45, G. A. R., Department of Nebraska.

I. The members of the Post will meet at their hall at 1 o'clock p. m. and move out from their quarters at 2 o'clock, standard time.

The Adjutant will arrange the Post in one division in charge of the Post Commander.

II. The colors will be carried at the head of the column with a color guard of four comrades without arms, with the martial band in front. The command, when so formed, upon Main street, in front of their quarters, will be presented to the Commander by the Adjutant, who will take charge of the Post, and who will give the word of command to move forward to the cemetery by the way of Washington avenue.

III. The carriages containing the floral offerings and the committee of young ladies in charge of the same, will head the column, accompanied by eight mounted guards wearing side arms.

IV. All members of visiting Posts and all soldiers who do not belong to the Post, are invited to fall in with the column and accompany the Post to the cemetery.

V. Comrade Joseph W. Johnson, Marshal of the Day, will take charge of the citizens' procession and form the same immediately in the rear of the column, and will be in charge of the line of march.

VI. Comrades Poissall and McMakin will have charge of the preparation of a platform upon the grounds donated to the Post, and will perform such other duties as may be necessary to carry forward the exercises at the cemetery.

VII. The committee having general charge of the Memorial services, will ascertain and report the number of graves to be decorated, and will place suitable flags, with names, at the head of each grave.

The following programme will be observed at the cemetery;

1st. Music—by the choir.

2d. Prayer—by the Chaplain, from the ritual.

3d. Address—by the Commander.

4th. Music—by the choir.

5th. Oration.

6th. Music—by the choir.

7th. Benediction—by Chaplain Alpha Wright.

8th. Decoration of graves according to ritual.

VIII. All citizens of Plattsmouth and Cass county are requested to unite with the Post in a proper observance of Memorial Day.

IX. In case the weather is unsuitable the exercises will be held in Rockwood Hall.
