GENERAL NEWS.

The June Storms.

The Firemen's Tournament at Des Moines.

Washington Notes.

PASSED.
Washington, June 12.—The house passed the river and harbor bill—yeas 156, nays 104.

FILIBUSTER ARRESTED.
The government authorities today received a telegram from special agent Hobbs at Key West, Florida, as follows: "Marveso, secretary of the revolutionary committee here, was arrested by the marshal with explosive material per steamer from New York. His examination was postponed until tomorrow. Sealed letters were in his baggage, unopened, addressed to prominent revolutionists."

NO MORE SPEECH PRINTING.
Senator Vest submitted to the senate today an amendment he proposes to the legislative appropriation bill, to provide that no money be paid out of the treasury or from any public fund for printing in the Congressional Record any speech which has not been actually delivered or spoken in either the senate or house.

THE UNION PACIFIC EXAMINATION.
The report of the experts who examined the books of the Union Pacific railroad company was handed to Secretary Teller yesterday in a sealed envelope. It was locked in a safe without being read by the secretary or any one else in his office. It is asserted positively that no information will possibly be given out concerning the character of the report and that nothing can be known of its contents until the return of Secretary Teller, who left for New York this forenoon. Commissioner Armstrong is also absent from the city. No one has seen the report except the commissioner and the experts who made the examination.

DIRECTORS ELECTED.
St. Joseph, June 12.—The election of directors of the St. Joseph & Western railway took place today at West St. Joseph, Kansas. The Union Pacific interest and the Benedict party were equal in the number of shares represented. By a mutual understanding directors were chosen making about an equal division between the two interests.

HEAVY STORMS.
Pittsburg, June 12.—Points along the Allegheny valley were visited yesterday by one of the heaviest rain storms known in many years, causing the most destructive flood since 1865. At Brookville, Pa., a water spout burst, and in less than two hours the creeks rose ten feet, transforming it into a seething, foaming torrent. The rapid rise gave mill men no chance whatever to save their stock. Dams at the North Fork mills, Bryant & Wainwright's and Litch's mills gave way, carrying with them lumber valued at \$70,000. Two bridges washed away and many small buildings were demolished. A number of families were driven from their homes and compelled to seek shelter elsewhere for the night. In Pittsburg the rise in the Allegheny last night was very rapid and a number of coal barges were swept from their moorings, but were caught again by tow boats uninjured. The flood at Brookville brought down about 50,000 pieces of lumber, and almost every owner of a skill is busy today catching driftwood. The water is now subsiding and no further damage is anticipated.

A New Martinsville, West Virginia, special says a terrific thunder storm passed over the city last night doing much damage. A boy named McIntyre and a companion, who took refuge under a tree, were rendered senseless by the lightning which struck the tree. McIntyre's recovery is doubtful.

FATAL SHOOTING.
Memphis, June 12.—News has been received of a deadly affray at New Albany, Miss., between F. Revis, mayor of the town and editor of the Union County Optic, and Lloyd Ford, a good-for-nothing desperado. They had an altercation about the congressional contest between Morgan and Watson, candidates for the democratic nomination. Each shot five times. Ford was shot in the breast, from which he died. One bullet from Ford's pistol struck Squire Revis' father, J. R. Revis, inflicting a flesh wound in the leg. Just as Ford was about dying he said to a bystander

"Did I run?" "No!" "Then I die in peace."
DASTARDLY CUTTING.
Bardonia, Kentucky, June 12.—William Doon, a worthless negro, while drunk cut out the bowels of George Hughes, a hotel clerk, for ordering him away from the premises. Hughes will die. The negro will probably be lynched.

THE FIREMEN.
Des Moines, June 12.—The third day of the tournament was very favorable, and the contest of great interest. The prize for ladder climbing was won by Henry Gillet, of Atlantic. Time 5 3/4 seconds. The Storm Lake band engine won first money on time and distance. The Council Bluffs team won on coupling in 4 1/2 seconds. The 46-second class hose contest was won by Sawyers, of Iowa City, in 44 1/2 seconds. The championship of the state had eight entries, and the first three were, Waterloo, 44; Council Bluffs, 45 1/2; Iowa City, 46 1/2. The took and ladder race was won by Atlantic in 47 1/2. All but the hand engines are under protest, and will be decided tomorrow. In the evening the location of the next tournament was made at Davenport, and the following officers elected for the ensuing year—President, P. Lacy, of Council Bluffs; vice president, E. E. Brauard, of Iowa City; second vice-president, M. J. Wheeler, of Denison; third vice-president, Gustave Vandohren, of Davenport; recording secretary, A. L. Tullous, of Winterset; corresponding secretary, Col. McManus, of Dubuque; treasurer, Arch Christy, of Des Moines.
