Three Groves Letter.

ED. HERALD:—It has been so long since I have gathered any items for your paper, that we are out of practice, however I will try and send you a few notes once more if you will be a little patient until I get just a little in practice.

There has been quite a number of newsy items gone unpublished of late, that would be interesting, but time and space will not admit of it now, and I hardly know where to begin, or which to take first.

One very important one at least, comes to my mind just now, concerning your paper since our postoffice has been discontinued it has been coming very irregular. It seems to be weekly, semi-monthly, monthly and sometimes none at all, if we should judge from the way it arrives here.

The postoffice here being discontinued, has thrown a great amount of mail matter off the track, some of it going on to Union, and some stopping at Rock Bluffs. It is supposed this is one reason of the HERALD not reaching its readers at this place as regular as it should.

Crops as a general thing look well in this locality. The spring being backward, has made corn very late, owing to so much cloudy weather and bad seed corn, farmers had to plant a second time. Farmers will, without a doubt, have a good variety of seed corn this fall as can be found in any state. The seed that was planted in this part of Cass county was obtained from all parts of the compass, and from different states. As a general thing a good stand of corn can be seen throughout every portion of the neighborhood, the second planting will be late, very little having been planted in June, in fact we do not know of one piece being planted this month. A very large acreage has been planted.

Small grain is looking exceedingly well; not so much sown as usual. The falling off of the acreage of small grain has greatly increased the acreage of corn.

Quarterly meeting was held at the brick school house on last Saturday and Sunday, a very large number being in attendance, crowding the school house to its utmost capacity. Very able sermons were preached on Saturday afternoon and Sunday by the Elder, it v. — from Lincoln.

Rock Bluffs is making preparations for a grand celebration to be held there on the 4th of July, one or two meetings have been held in order to make arrangements. We presume they will have some good band music given by the Rock Bluffs brass band, as they are making some preparation for it. The band boys can make some good music and everybody will hear good music if they spend the 4th there.
