ABURGLARY IN BELLEVUE.

How They Were Caught. Omaha was yesterday relieved of the presence of a couple of her suspicious characters, who, from present appearances, will be held for some time by the Sarpy county authorities.

On last Thursday night the depot at Bellevue was burglarized. On the same night Wright's general merchant store was entered and \$125 worth of goods, consisting of clothing, boots and shoes, hats and caps, etc., were taken. The burglars filled their pockets with fiberts. After they had walked quite a distance from the scene of their robbery, they sat down and ate part of them. They kept on eating them after they continued their journey, dropping the snacks along the path. By this means they were able to be tracked to Omaha, where they were found by a constable from Sarpy county near Loj's packing house. When arrested they were wearing a part of the stolen property.

They were taken to Sarpy county where a complaint for burglary was filed against them in Justice Martin's court. On examination they were held in the sum of \$1,000 to appear at the next term of the district court. Being unable to give bail they were remanded to jail.

Their names were Smith and Hendrickson and were in this city nearly all last winter and spring. It is said that they were sent up once by Judge Bencke for vagrancy.—Bee.

Judicial Central Committee Meeting.

The judicial committee of this district met at the office of D. H. Wheeler in this city this morning at 10 o'clock. All the committeemen were present, either in person or by proxy.

The meeting was called to order by D. H. Wheeler, chairman, and on motion, those holding written proxies, were entitled to vote and participate in the proceedings of the meeting.

On motion, J. B. Strode was elected secretary of the committee. It was decided to hold the Judicial Convention on Tuesday, August 19th, at 10 o'clock a. m. A vote on place of holding the convention being taken resulted as follows: Plattsmouth five votes, Nebraska City two votes.

On motion, it was decided to base the representation upon the vote cast for J. M. Hiatt, Regent of the University, giving one delegate at large and one for every hundred and fifty votes and the major fraction thereof, which will entitle Cass county to 13 votes, Lancaster, to 21 votes, and Otoe to 11 votes.

Hon. L. W. Buntingley, of Lincoln, was in the city today, attending the judicial committee meeting, and after visiting around the town spoke of the wonderful growth of the town since he last saw it, several years ago.
