**BUTLER WILL RUN.**

**The Irish Not for Cleveland.**

BEN WILL RUN.

Chicago, July 16.—Information has been received from close friends of General Butler by B. F. Shively, "secretary of the anti-monopolist committee," dispelling doubts regarding Butler's candidacy for the presidency on an independent ticket, and positively, that he will run. Shively, who is at the Briggs house in this city, expressed today the most absolute certainty that Butler will be a candidate, with the endorsement of the greenbackers, anti-monopolists, and probably the laboring men. Butler's refusal, at present, to make a public statement, Shively says, is prompted by a desire to first see what can be done by the convention of labor representatives, to be held in Chicago, July 30.

Washington, July 16.—The Star says: The impression seems to be that Ex-Senator Wallace will be elected chairman of the national democratic committee. It is thought Governor Cleveland prefers Manning of New York, but the understanding is that he (Manning) does not want the position. He has promised to devote his time to the canvass and to aid the committee to the full extent of his ability, but does not want to be the responsible head. From good authority it is learned that Randall forbids the use of his name. He will not stand in Wallace's way. At Chicago Randall was ably supported by Wallace, and it is said the former will do all he can to have the latter made chairman of the committee.

WHAT THE NEXT PRESIDENT SAYS.  
 New Haven, Conn., July 16.—Ex-Auditor Edward McCarthy, a local democratic leader, who bolted Cleveland's nomination, received tonight a personal letter from Mr. Blaine, thanking him for his pledge of support. Blaine's letter is as follows:

Augusta, Maine, July 14.—Edward McCarthy, Dear Sir: Accept my sincere thanks for your kind letter of congratulation. I regret that I can make but this informal acknowledgment just now. I can question the right of no man or body to vote as they elect, but I will say that I am heartily grateful to have found new friends in your beautiful city. The democratic managers are not a little puzzled by the unexpected attitude of a considerable portion of the Irish element against the democratic ticket. At first they were happy in the belief that only the "dynamite" Irishmen who labor under the impression that Blaine's accession to the presidential chair will be inaugurated by a vigorous

TAIL-TWISTING OF THE BRITISH LION were concerned in the revolt against the democratic nominations, but the few days that have elapsed since the adjournment of the democratic convention have sufficed to bring forth unmistakable signs of a not inconsiderable disaffection among the Irish, which is all the more surprising to the democratic managers, as it is largely based on that powerful, and not easily to be neutralized factor, national prejudice.

Avoiding altogether the Irishmen of Richelieu Robinson type, who desire to have the tail of the British lion twisted makes them hardly good judges of one who should be the president of this country, a reporter of the Times yesterday made it his business to sound the opinion of many of the Irish residents of Chicago on the democratic ticket, and found that the Irishmen are in no mood, at least not at present, to pull off their coats for the election of the democratic ticket. The reporter's investigations were confined to people who were found in the down town streets and resorts, but he conversed with men in all stations of life, and was careful to talk only with people about whose affiliation with the democratic party he had no doubt.

Many were democratic office holders, and for that reason no names can be given, as officeholders do not like to appear in print when making statements unfavorable to the prospects of their party.

An officeholder standing high among the Irish people in this city and occupying a position which gives him excellent opportunities to obtain correct information about the feeling of his countrymen, said, after having exacted a promise that his name should not be divulged: "There is no use talking about it, the Irishmen in Chicago and Cook county are largely opposed to the democratic ticket. Were the election

to be held within a week the Irish vote cast for the democratic national ticket would not amount to as many hundred as it used to thousands."
