Accidents and Crimes.

POLITICAL POINTS.

Pittsburg, July 19.—Prohibitionists are rapidly getting matters in shape for the meeting of the national convention, held in this city next week. Col. George Babcock and Mrs. Emily Pitt Stevens, of California, have arrived, and are the advance courants of what is hoped to be a boom for Dr. R. H. McDonald, of California. Delegates are not expected to arrive in any considerable number before Monday night or Tuesday morning. The executive committee will meet at the St. Charles hotel Tuesday at 2 p. m., and the national at the same place an hour later.

New York, July 19.—At the headquarters of the republican national committee, Blaine's letter of acceptance is regarded as a very able document.

Washington, D. C. July 19.—The cabinet decided to take vigorous measures to prevent the introduction of cholera into the United States. The state and treasury departments will act together in enforcing the regular orders which are to be prepared. An order will be issued prohibiting the importation of rags from all infected countries for ninety days or longer if necessary. It was also decided that vessels in the revenue marine service shall establish a cordon along the coast to prevent the landing of vessels from foreign ports that do not possess clear bills of health.

CHOLERA INFECTED RAG REPORT DENIED.

Ottawa, Can., July 19.—There is no truth in the statement purporting to come from Washington that paper and rags supposed to have been collected in cholera infected districts in Europe, are being imported into the United States through the Canadian ports. United States importers should see that necessary precaution is taken before shipment. The dominion cannot tell what is in bales and the fault of not taking necessary precautions must rest with the United States authorities.

A PROHIBITION VICTORY.

Muscatine, Ia., July 19.—The first trial under the new prohibitory law in this county resulted in a victory for the prohibitionists. The defendant, James Wier, a prominent saloonkeeper of Muscatine, was found guilty on two counts and fined \$100 on each, the full limit of the law. The case was fought inch by inch by the saloon men and was appealed to the district court. Similar cases are pending against four other saloon men. Wier openly defied the law and has reopened his saloon today.

FATHER AND SON LEAP TO DEATH.

Clifton Forge, Va., July 19.—At Irongate, Va., yesterday, Thomas Johnson stripped his stepson and tied his hands to whip him. The boy escaped, ran to the river and jumped in. Johnson followed, the current was swift and both were drowned. The bodies were recovered last night.

THE ORDER OF THE RED CROSS.

Washington, July 19.—Miss Clara Barton, president, and Mr. A. S. Solomon, vice president of the American association of the Red Cross, have been appointed by the president as delegates to represent the United States at the general conference of the International association in September next.

THE RAILROAD WAR ENDED.

Cleveland, O., July 19.—The cutting of passenger rates between here and New York ended tonight with the departure of Dunbar's excursion, via the West Shore, to meet whose \$15 rate the trunk lines cut the round trip fare to \$12, and the old rates will be re-established tomorrow.

AND THE WORK GOES BRAVELY ON.

Tuscaloosa, Ala., July 19.—Henry Burke (colored) who attempted to outrage a little white girl, was captured last night in the garret of an old house. A mob at midnight took him from jail, hanged him to a tree in the street and put five bullets in his body.

A WOMAN'S LONG TRAMP

ALBANY, N. Y. July 19.—Mrs. Mary H. Connell has walked from Chicago to this place. According to her story she was formerly a domestic in William H. Vanderbilt's family and during the last fifteen years she has lived in Chicago. Her husband James' who was engineer on the Michigan & St. Paul Railroad was killed about a year ago by an accident. She claimed that there were two months' wages due him, which the company refused to pay her. She hopes to enlist Vanderbilts interest in behalf of her claim against the railroad, and is determined to get

to New York some how. She has no money, and stayed in the Second Precinct station house last night. She is a plain looking woman, wears a sun-bonnet, carries a small basket, which contains a few articles of clothing and when she refers to her husband she fishes out of the bottom of the basket a tin type of a good looking man, with broad shoulders, heavy beard and large moustach.
