Wheeler, of Cass, was elected temporary secretary.  
On motion made, seconded and adopted, the chairman appointed Messrs. R. D. Stearns, J. W. Johnson, Prof. E. L. Bluedorn and S. M. Melick a committee upon credentials.  
On motion the convention took a recess for ten minutes.

The convention reassembled pursuant to order made upon taking a recess, whereupon the committee upon credentials submitted the following REPORT.

Mr. Murphy, of Cass County, moved that the vote by which the report of the committee upon credentials was adopted be reconsidered. On the question to reconsider a vote by counties was ordered. Upon a vote being taken, it resulted as follows: For the motion to reconsider, Cass County 13 votes; against the motion to reconsider, Lancaster County 21 votes. Whereupon the chairman declared the motion lost.

On motion an informal vote was taken for District Attorney by ballot, which resulted as follows:

Murfin, 23 votes.  
Blank, 1 vote.  
Strode, 4 votes.

Whereupon Mr. R. D. Stearns moved that Jesse B. Strode, of Cass County, be declared the unanimous choice of this convention for District Attorney by acclamation, which motion was unanimously adopted.

On motion the convention selected a Judicial District Committee of two from each county, with Capt. L. W. Billingsley, of Lancaster as chairman. The following gentlemen were thereupon selected:
