New Year's in Plattsmouth passed by remarkably quiet, and all seemed bent on resting and enjoying the opening day preparatory to tackling the routine of a busy life for the year to come. There was no entertainment at the Opera House, no ball in the evening, and the day was in all particulars an uneventful one.

Meeting of the Legislature—Candidates.

The near approach of biennial meeting of the State legislature is making things unusually lively about the state-halls of the capitol these cold days. Rooms are being put in order, new furnishings supplied where necessary, and everything put in readiness for the arrival of the State solons.

The legislature will meet at 12 o'clock, noon on Tuesday of next week, and already members elect have been dropping in, picking out their seats and having them marked so that nobody may jump their claims on the opening day. The first thing will be the election of officers, and candidates are more numerous than ever. The candidates for speaker are, Field, of Lincoln; Stevenson of Nebraska City; Lee of Oxford, and Nettleton of Clay county. The fight will probably be between the two former, and it is a question as to which will carry off the crown of victory.

There are a number of candidates for secretary of the senate, the principal being Sherwood Burr, of Fillmore county; Walter Seeley, of Lancaster; Slaughter, of Nance, and Mercer, of Nemaha.

For chief clerk of the house, the names mentioned are Frank Wilson, of Cass, and James Zediker, of Franklin. Both have served as clerks before, and thoroughly understand their duties.

Three senators are mentioned as candidates for president pro tem of the senate. They are Ezra Brown, of Clay; J. B. Skinner of Nuckolls, and Church Howe, of Nemaha.

After the organization of the senate, the two houses will meet in joint session, probably Thursday afternoon to receive the Governor's message, at which time the new State officers will be duly inaugurated.—Lincoln News.

Kirkpatrick Dangerously Ill.

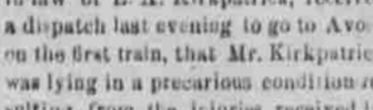
Dr. John Black, of this city, father-in-law of E. A. Kirkpatrick, received a dispatch last evening to go to Avoca on the first train, that Mr. Kirkpatrick was lying in a precarious condition resulting from the injuries received by him when he was slugged and robbed in Weeping Water. The particulars of the robbery, as near as we can collect them are, that on Monday last Mr. Kirkpatrick went up from Avoca to Weeping Water where he received from the bank some fourteen hundred dollars. While waiting for the train south to Avoca, in the evening, he went into Yeaman's billiard hall, and from there to the water closet in the rear where he was knocked senseless and choked by some unknown assailant who secured his money and made good his escape. Kirkpatrick was cared for and taken home to Avoca, where he has been lying very ill. The theory of the robbery or who did the deed is not as yet developed. It is said only three persons knew that he had his money on his person, but some strangers must have been lying in wait for him.

Among the visitors shortly to the New Orleans Exposition will be Mr. Henry Beck, who proposes to have a little vacation and relaxation after a hard year's work.

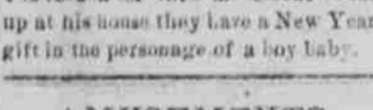
The steam heating apparatus, at the Waterman Opera House block, became congested, as it were, yesterday and last night to the small inconvenience of the dwellers in the block.
