THE HERALD believes that if proper steps are taken, and that if a conference is held with the B. & M. officials, that a new depot can be secured for this city.

Not only when the time approaches for the Board of Agriculture meeting does the HERALD raise its voice against the wheel within the wheel, but all the year round will the HERALD be heard until incompetents are weeded out and the Board is placed with its relations between itself and the State, above a star chamber organization, which through mutual threats and recriminations perpetuates itself in power. The Reporter makes a wild assertion when he denies corruption in the ring, in toto. It simply does not know what it is talking about. But the HERALD did not get into the habit of pitching into the State Board ten or five years ago. It may have needed it then, but it certainly needs it now, and the needs for rebukes have not passed away. The State pays an appropriation each year; does it all go for premiums? Is the State Board more interested in the agricultural business, or in horse, or chariot races? Is the work of the State fair to simply draw a crowd, or to favor agricultural interests? Are a large number of members in position simply to receive free rail-ride and portation and grant complimentary tickets to political friends and hangers-on, or are they for the people? Has there or has there not been smoothed expense accounts? Are all these expenses legitimate State fair expenses? Does the membership of the State Board know? Let the books of the last few years be opened; let the people know.

So far as Mr. McIntyre is concerned, he is one of many in the Board; the HERALD has no personal warfare in the matter. The State Board, as constituted is a perpetuating, and no outsider need apply. It is wrong from the ground up, and ought to be reorganized. Turn out incompetents, and clean the Augean stables.

Every year as the time approaches for the meeting of the State Board of Agriculture, the Plattsmouth Herald indulges in a long-winded tirade against the Board and its management. Why the Herald is unable to see any good in the organization, we cannot guess. The Board has for several years, in our judgment, been doing the best that it could, and while errors have undoubtedly been made, the actions of the Board in general have been for the best. As to its being a corrupt ring we deny the charge in toto. Such men as have had next to do with its management of late years are not likely to identify themselves with any corrupt ring. The Herald says a few wise changes were made a year ago, and names of officers who have made good record during the year; but it does not stop to consider that the same men have shaped the actions of the Board, with which it finds fault, for years past. It truly says that J. B. Dinwiddie has made an excellent president, but the inference to be drawn from its remarks is that his predecessor was not a good officer. This is not the first time that the Herald has made a similar insinuation, but the record of Edmund McIntyre for half a score of years as a member of the Board, and two years as its president, is sufficient refutation of any charges or insinuations of inefficiency or corruption. The trouble with the Herald must be, that it got into the habit of pitching into the State Board of Agriculture years ago, when it was necessary, and now can't see that the need for such rebukes has passed away. The Herald would do well to look around and see that the Board is a different organization from what it was ten years ago, and stop growling about mismanagement that does not exist. -Seward Reporter.

STATE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND ITS FINANCES

We have been at some trouble to investigate the charge that the finances of the administration of the State Board of 1884 compare unfavorably with the results accomplished by gentlemen conducting the affairs of the society in former years, and find the following to be the true financial condition of the society; and the causes which led to the present low ebb in the society's finances to be due to the following causes, and not attributable to maladministration on the part of Mr. Furnas, as insinuated by the Plattsmouth Journal. It is true there is only \$300 in the treasury, but is also true that the society loaned \$1,000 to the State to aid in making Nebraska's creditable exhibit at the New Orleans Exposition. It is also true that the management were compelled to pay \$1,800 to the Omaha Driving Park, for the use of the fair grounds for 1884, an expense never forced on the Board in former years, and an expense that Mr. Furnas is in no way responsible for. It is further charged by the present managers that many unforseen appropriations were demanded on account of former neglect, the most notable being the purchase of medals awarded to exhibitors at the fairs of 1882 and 1883, and for which the claimants have been clamoring for two years. We are assured that a full and complete showing of the State Board will be made at the coming meeting, which promises to be the most interesting ever held in the history of the society.
