It was further learned during the ferenoon by the doctor that the meeting would be held at 8 o'clock that night. Mr. M. A. Hartigan, the old sec ctary, was then requested by Dr. Mercer, to call the meeting so it might be held in the day time, as was contemplated by the laws, which request was refused by Mr. Hartigan. Dr. Mercer then notified Mr. Hartigan that a meeting of the stockholders would be held at the office of Covell & Polk, at two o'clock in the afternoon, and written notices were sent to the different stockholders in the city notifying them of the meeting.
