THE communistic tendencies of the Plattsmouth Journal are becoming too strong to be relished by even the ordinary law-abiding citizen. Not satisfied with expressing good will and sympathy towards the strikers, as many good citizens do, and yet leave the combatants to fight their own battles, it takes particular pains to magnify every mishap of the company into a gigantic accident and lay it all to the employment of "scabs," not withstanding the well known fact that many accidents have occurred on the road immediately prior to the strike. It seems to relish a narrative of the wreckage and destruction of life and property. And if at all, mildly reprehends the acts of personal violence that has frequently occurred on our streets in their attempt to intimidate men from a discharge of their duty. And then to add insult to injury, tells the public at large that the Journal expresses the public sentiment of Plattsmouth. It is very evident that the city has suffered more experience and injury by reason of the strikers' course than from the injury of the strike and our citizens are tired of the program. The Board of Trade has called its attention this

sheet, the Journal, condemning Fred Gorder and Frank Guthman for having with hundreds of others censored the course of the Journal. The facts are, that there are not two better citizens in the town, and that although Fred Gorder was defeated for councilman in the first ward, the most potent reason for his defeat was because the Journal was for him. Mr. Gorder's defeat meant nothing personal against Mr. Gorder, he has the respect and esteem of the best elements of both parties. The methods of the last council disgusted many of the tax payers, who wanted city improvements pushed energetically to completion. Mr. Gorder was looked upon as being too conservative, it seemed we needed some young blood in the council and we got it. As to Mr. Guthman, he is neither a communist nor anarchist, but an intelligent public spirited gentleman, and but speaks the sentiment of this community when he says God knows I don't want to control the Journal, and more than that I do not want my city to be misrepresented by such a sheet. This job of trying to injure and belittle the character of old and respected citizens will only injure the man or newspaper that indulges in so reprehensible an act.

THE new high-license law has closed 500 saloons in Pittsburg out of a total of 727 in operation a year ago. The law is doing equally effective work in the remainder of the state. This is the record which is disrupting the prohibition party throughout Pennsylvania, and sending its members back to the republican fold. —Globe-Democrat.

**The Nobility in Germany.**

The manners of people of high rank in Germany are amusing to a stranger. Nowhere in the world are "dukes and duchesses and such" so unpretentious as here. In the hotel where I am stopping there are several princes of note who are waiting an improvement in the emperor's condition before returning home. Soldiers guard the entrances of the hotels in their honor, but that is the beginning and end of all ceremony. The Duke of Saxe-Meinigen, a tall, amiable looking man with a big gray beard, and the Duke of Salm-Horsmar, who is blonde and dyspeptic, wander unconcerned about, followed by droves of men in magnificent uniforms. Wherever they go people rise and remain standing till the men of title have seated themselves. Then there is a general sinking into seats and covert looks toward the great men.

When the princesses—of whom there are a dozen or so—take it in their royal little blonde heads to dine in the public dining room, an enormous sensation is created. People have to bob up and down repeatedly when they enter, and all the officers kiss the princesses' hands with the most reverential and impressive homage. It's funny to see the princesses turn their faces and watch the kissing. They feel about the same interest in it as a cow does when she turns around and looks contemptively at the maid who is milking her. The officers are dandies out and out. They never attempt to conceal it. They wear stays, and when they take off their helmets and caps in the big restaurants and hotels they lean over the tables and calmly arrange their hair with little combs and brushes carried in the coat tail pockets. This takes a long time as a rule. The spectators evince a respectful interest in it, and when it is at length completed there is a general sigh of relief and satisfaction, the officers bow to one another politely, and the world rolls on again upon its axis.—Blakely Hall's Berlin Letter in New York Sun.

**Persia's Divorce Laws.**

In Persia, as in Turkey, if a husband wishes a divorce from his wife all he has to do is to order her out of the house. As a check upon the too free use of this arbitrary proceeding, however, the Persians have constituted a very curious and ingenious custom. While the Mohammedan laws make it so easy for a husband to put away his wife, it secures to her all her own property. Under no consideration can the husband deprive the wife of her own property. As a precaution against divorce, then, the husband in the marriage contract is usually required to promise a considerable sum of money as a wedding gift to his bride. This money is not forthcoming at the wedding, nor expected, but it is placed to the wife's credit as a debt owed to her by the husband. As in case of divorce this money would have to be paid over, the amount is usually made so large that it is virtually beyond the husband's means. In that case divorce to him would mean financial ruin; and as a Persian's pocket is the most susceptible part about him, it follows that there is no divorce. Owing to this ingenious arrangement, although a mere angry order to begone is a legal divorce, there are fewer divorces in Persia than in the United States.—Thomas Stevens in New York Sun.
