A Boy Drowned.

FREMONT, Neb., May 23.—On Saturday a four-year-old son of a farmer named Hendrickson, living on Spooner & Lyman's farm near Hooper, fell into the Elkhorn river and was drowned. A constant search for the body of the little fellow has not, at this time, resulted in its recovery.

A Soldier Fatally Shot.

VALENTINE, Neb., May 23.—A fatal accident occurred at Fort Niobrara today. Private Hoolahan, of Company A, Eighth Infantry was shot through the arm and body while on target duty. He had arranged the target and was in the act of backing out from it when he received the shot which will undoubtedly cost him his life.

A Mysterious Murder.

DUKE, Fla., May 22.—L. D. Gore, an old citizen of this county (Volusia), living near Bulow, was shot while at work in his clearing last Tuesday. Four rifle balls entered his body near the heart and death followed almost instantly. There is no clue to his assassin or murderers. It is believed that political strife is at the bottom of the affair, as Gore had taken a strong stand against the "ring" that controlled the county, and had, it is said, some damaging secrets of theirs. No steps have been taken by the authorities to bring the murderers to justice.

They Went Through the Town.

WAHOO, Neb., May 23.—Last night Wahoo was visited by a set of sneak thieves and burglars. They first entered the house of N. H. Bell and took his gold watch, pocket-book, \$49.70 in cash and two pair of pantaloons, then crossed the street to the house of R. Sefranek and left the pantaloons taken at Bell's, and took a half case of beer. From there they went to the house of Emile Fisher, and abstracted his pants and loose change, then to the house of Dr. Hawes, where they were discovered and fled. No clue to the identity or whereabouts of the scoundrels has been discovered.

State Sunday School Association.

YORK, Neb., May 23.—The Nebraska Sunday-school association meets here at 2 p. m. today and continues until Thursday evening. A large attendance is at this early hour assured. The order of exercises this afternoon is, a prayer and praise meeting led by Rev. G. W. Martin, Ph. D., of North Platte; addresses of welcome by Hon. A. D. Wycoff, mayor of York; response by President C. C. White, of Valparaiso; report from county associations and schools. This evening there will be a praise meeting, led by Rev. J. H. Presson, Seward, and an address on the subject of "More Room" by Rev. Willard Scott, of Omaha. Ralph Wells, of New York, will address the association upon "How to use the Bible." The programme for Wednesday and Thursday is excellent, and great interest is being manifested in it.

The Methodists Succeed in Electing Two Bishops.

NEW YORK, May 22.—At the session of the General Methodist conference today the report on the election of a second missionary bishop to India came up. Before actual voting began much time was taken up in settling the question as to whether ballots containing less than the required number of names should be counted or thrown out. After much discussion it was decided to count them, and voting began in earnest. On the third ballot this evening Rev. Dr. J. H. Vincent, of Rock river conference, and Rev. W. J. Fitzgerald, of the New Jersey conference, were elected bishops. Adjournment was taken before the result of the fourth ballot could be known.

A Collision at Humboldt.

HUMBOLDT, Neb., May 22.—A collision occurred at 12:30 today between engine No. 77 and freight No. 78 and the Lincoln passenger No. 71. The freight had orders to side track here for the passenger and cut loose the engine from the train about one-half mile from the depot, intending to run in and open the switch. Train No. 71 was standing on the main track and the engineer seeing that the engine had lost control of the incoming engine, reversed and had the train under pretty good headway before the collision took place and by his prompt action saved his engine and nothing is damaged but the pilot broken off. Men are now engaged in clearing the track. Engine No. 75 is badly damaged. Fortunately no one is injured although the passengers were badly shaken up and scared. The wrecked engine was running about eight miles an hour at the time of the accident. The cause of the collision was that the

link block pin had worked out and caught in the link saddle, making it impossible to reverse the engine.

Court House Robbed.

WILBER, Neb., May 23.—The court house at this place was burglarized last night. The county judge's office, the sheriff's office, the county clerk's office and the county treasurer's office all were forced open and more or less plunder taken, but little cash is believed to have been stolen. The sheriff's office was entered through a window and the safe opened and about \$6 or \$7 in cash abstracted therefrom. No other loss, save that of a pair of excellent revolvers belonging to the sheriff. From the sheriff's office the prowlers entered the clerk's office by a partition which was not locked, where they opened all drawers and handled papers rather carelessly and finally selected a fine cigar-holder, a present from an old county friend of the clerk's, and left in disgust.

The judge's office was entered through a window from the north. The vault was opened and papers promiscuously scattered, but nothing is missing so far as Judge Rhine has examined. The vault was evidently on the day lock and easily opened.

The treasurer's office door was forced open and the vault door drilled, considerable powder burned, the knobs and handles broken off, but it is believed that no entrance was effected. If this vault was opened the safe inside was probably robbed of about \$700 cash, all it contained and the vault door closed and battered up to mislead or baffles the officers. The thief carried away the treasurer's revolver, but nothing further is missing. A part of the tools used by the burglars were taken from a Bohemian's blacksmith shop in Bohemian-town and consisted of a pick, a hammer, an adz, chisel and a few iron bars, all of which were left in the court house but the drill with which the drilling was done in the treasurer's office has not been found.

No definite clue has been settled upon as to the party or parties perpetrating this crime but it is believed that the parties followed the deputy sheriff Pat Malory from Crete yesterday, where he had sold a farm at sheriff's sale and carried back to Wilber with him the proceeds of the sale, \$2,625 but which he had fortunately placed in a bank on his arrival in Wilber.
