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NATIONAL REPUBLICAN TICKET.

FOR PRESIDENT, BENJAMIN HARRISON, of Indiana. FOR VICE PRESIDENT, LEVI P. MORTON, of New York.

Rev. J. G. TATE, of Shelton, Nebraska, made the best tariff speech last night at the banquet, we ever heard.

On account of the rigid drawing of partisan lines for the presidential canvass, there is a movement of votes to and from each of the big parties and the republicans seem to be gaining four or five to every one they lose.

The declaration of Gen. Harrison that "the success of the republican party has always been identified with the glory of the flag and the unity of the government" is not only a shining historical truth, but it is suggestive furthermore of the significant fact that the record of the democratic party is blackened with the guilt and shame of a directly contrary course.

The original Mills bill put marble in blocks on the free list. When that part of the bill came up for consideration, however, a few days ago, a Tennessee member of the House said that free marble would destroy an important industry in his state. As it would be wicked to injure an industry of a democratic state the democratic majority struck out that provision, and the duty on this product will remain unchanged. This sectionalism is one of the most iniquitous features of the Mills bill, but it is only one of them.—Globe Democrat.

SENATOR SHERMAN declares that he is for Harrison and Morton "through thick and thin," and that he intends to take the stump for the ticket in Ohio and Indiana. "I shall specially dwell in my speeches," he says, "upon the fact that free trade means a great reduction in the prices of all farm products, and no reduction, comparatively speaking, in the prices of agricultural implements or other materials or articles that the farmer has to use in connection with his business." Those democratic editors who have been representing that Mr. Sherman was irreconcilably sore over his defeat at Chicago will do well to take account of this manly contradiction of their charge.

THREE SIGNS OF VICTORY.

Thus early there are three well defined and strong indications of republican success:

- First—The absolute unity of the republican party everywhere. The candidates and the platform are welcomed with one universal shout of approval. Second—Scores of men who have heretofore voted with the democrats are publicly declaring their adherence to the republicans on the protection issue. These scores to be followed by thousands as the campaign progresses. Third—Irish-Americans in many cities are promptly organizing Harrison and Morton clubs. The intelligent Irishman has no love for English free trade.

REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.

The republicans of the United States, assembled by their delegates at national convention, pause on the threshold of their proceedings to honor the memory of their first great leader and immortal champion of liberty and the rights of the people, Abraham Lincoln, and to cover also with wreaths of imperishable remembrance and gratitude the heroic names of our later leaders who have more recently called away from our councils, Grant, Garfield, Arthur, Logan and Conkling. Stay their griefs be faithfully cherished. We also recall with our greetings and prayers for his recovery the name of one of our living heroes whose memory will be treasured in the history both by republicans and by the enemies of the name. It is that of the noble soldier and favorite child of victory, Philip H. Sheridan.

In the spirit of our leaders and of our devotion to human liberty, and with that hostility to all forms of despotism and oppression which is the foundation of the republican party, we send fraternal congratulations to our fellow Americans of Brazil upon their great act of emancipation which completes the abolition of slavery throughout the two American continents. We earnestly hope we may soon congratulate our fellow citizens of Irish birth upon the peaceful recovery of home rule for Ireland.

WE AFFIRM OUR UNSWerving DEVOTION to the national constitution and to the indissoluble union of states to the autonomy reserved to the states under the constitution and the personal rights and liberties of citizens in all states and territories in the union and especially to the supreme and sovereign authority of every citizen, rich or poor, native or foreign born, white or black, to cast one free ballot in the public elections and to have that ballot duly counted. We hold a free and honest popular ballot and just and equal representation of all people to be the foundation of our republican government and demand effective legislation to secure the integrity and purity of elections which are the foundation of all public authority. We charge that the present administration and the democratic majority in congress have conspired to destroy the integrity of the ballot by the criminal nullification of the constitution and laws of the United States.

We are uncompromising in favor of the American system of protection. We protest against the destruction proposed by the president and his party. They serve the interests of Europe. WE WILL SUPPORT INTERESTS OF AMERICA. We accept the issue, and confidently appeal to the people for their judgment. The protective system must be maintained. Its abandonment has always been followed by general disaster to all interests except those of the insurer and sheriff.

We denounce the Mills' bill as destructive to general business, labor, and the farming interests of the country, and we heartily endorse the consistent and patriotic course of the republican representatives in congress in opposing its passage. We condemn the proposition of the democratic party to open a free list and insist that the duties thereon shall be adjusted and maintained so as to furnish full and adequate protection to that industry.

The republican party would effect all needed reduction of the national revenue by repealing the taxes on tobacco, which are an arrogant and burdensome tax, and the tax upon spirits used in the arts and for mechanical purposes, and by such revision of the tariff laws as will tend to check imports of such articles as are produced by our people, the production of which gives employment to our labor, and release from import duties these articles of foreign production, except luxuries. The like of which cannot be produced at home, there still remain a larger revenue than is requisite for the wants of government, of internal taxes rather than surrender any part of our protective system at the joint behest of the whiskey ring and agents of foreign manufacturers.

AGAINST CAPITAL AND LABOR TRUSTS. We declare hostility to the introduction into this country of foreign contract labor, and Chinese labor alien to our civilization and our constitution, and we demand the rigid enforcement of existing laws against it and favor such immediate legislation as will exclude such labor from our shores.

We declare our opposition to all combinations of capital organized in trusts or otherwise to control arbitrarily the condition of trade among our citizens and we recommend to congress and the state legislatures in their respective jurisdictions such legislation as will prevent the creation of all schemes to oppress the people by undue charges on their supplies or by unjust rates for the transportation of their products to market.

PUBLIC LAND LEGISLATION. We reaffirm the policy of appropriating the public lands of the United States to be homesteads for American citizens and settlers, not aliens, which the republican party established in 1852 against the persistent opposition of the democratic congress, which has brought our great western domain into magnificent development. The restoration of the public domain to the public domain, and of the original settlers, which was begun under the administration of President Arthur should be continued. We deny that the democratic party has ever restored one acre to the people, but declare that by the joint action of republicans and democrats about six million acres of unearned lands, originally granted to the construction of railroads, have been restored to the public domain in payment of conditions inserted by the republican party in the original grants. We charge the democratic administration with failure to execute laws securing settlers title to their homesteads and with using appropriations made for that purpose to harass honest settlers with spies and prosecutions under the false pretense of exposing frauds and vindicating the law.

ADMISSION OF TERRITORIES.

The government by congress of the territories is based upon necessity only to the end that they may become states in the union; therefore, whenever the conditions of population, material resources, public intelligence and morality are such as to insure stable local government therein the people of such territories should be permitted a right inherent in them, to form for themselves constitutions and state governments and be admitted into the union. Pending preparation for statehood all officers thereof should be selected from bona fide residents and citizens of the territory wherein they are to serve. South Dakota should be admitted as a state in the union under the constitution framed and adopted by her people, and we heartily endorse the action of the republican senate in twice passing bills for her admission. The refusal of the democratic house of representatives, for partisan purposes, to favorably consider these bills is a willful violation of the sacred American principle of local self-government, and merits the condemnation of all men. The pending bills in the senate for acts to enable the people of Washington, North Dakota and Montana territories to form constitutions and establish state governments should be passed without unnecessary delay. The republican party pledges itself to all its power to facilitate the admission of the territories of New Mexico, Wyoming, Idaho and Arizona to the enjoyment of self-government as states. Such of them as are now qualified as soon as possible, and others as soon as they may become so.

THE MORMON QUESTION.

The political power of the Mormon church in the territories as exercised in the past is a menace to free institutions too dangerous to be long suffered. Therefore we pledge the republican party to appropriate legislation asserting the sovereignty of the nation in all the territories where the same is questioned, and in furtherance of that end to place upon the statute book legislation stringent enough to remove political influence and power, and thus stamp out the attendant wickedness of polygamy. The republican party is in favor of the use of both gold and silver as money, and condemns the policy of the democratic administration in its efforts to demonetize silver. We demand the reduction of letter postage to 1 cent per ounce. In a republic like ours, where the citizen is the sovereign and the official the servant, where no power is exercised except by the will of the people, it is important that the sovereign people should possess intelligence. The free school is the promoter of that intelligence which is to preserve us a free nation. Therefore, the state or nation, or both combined, should support free institutions of learning sufficient to afford to every child good common-school education.

OUR MERCHANT MARINE.

We earnestly recommend that prompt action be taken in congress in the enactment of such legislation as will best secure the rehabilitation of our American merchant marine, and a free ship bill as calculated to work injurious to labor by lessening the wages of those engaged in preparing materials as well as those directly employed in our shipyards. We demand appropriations for the early rebuilding, fortification and modern ordnance and other approved modern means of defense for the protection of our defenseless harbors and cities, for the payment of just pensions to our soldiers, for necessary works of national importance in the improvement of the harbors and channels of internal, coastwise and foreign commerce, for the encouragement of

the shipping interests of the Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific states as well as for the payment of the maturing public debt. This policy will create employment for our labor, activity to our various industries, increased security to our country, promote trade, open new and direct markets for our products and cheapen the cost of transportation. We affirm this to be far better for our country than the democratic policy of loans to the government's money without interest to "pet banks."

FOREIGN RELATIONS.

The conduct of foreign affairs by the present administration has been distinguished by inefficiency and cowardice. Having withdrawn from the senate all pending treaties effected by the former administration for the removal of foreign burdens and restrictions upon our commerce and for its extension into a better market, it has neither proposed nor proposed any others in their stead. Professing adherence to the Monroe doctrine, it has seen with complacency the extension of foreign influence in Central America and of foreign trade everywhere among our neighbors. It has refused to charter, sanction or encourage any American organization for constructing the Nicaragua canal, a work of vital importance to the transportation of our goods to the west coast of our national influence in Central and South America, and necessary for the development of trade with our Pacific territory with South America, and with the further coasts of the Pacific Ocean.

FISHERIES QUESTION.

We arraign the present democratic administration for its weak and unpatriotic treatment of the fisheries question, and its pusillanimous surrender of all privileges to which our fishery vessels are entitled in Canadian ports under the treaty of 1818, the reciprocal marine legislation which have benefited our nation, and which Canadian fishing vessels receive in the ports of the United States. We condemn the policy of the present administration and the democratic majority in congress toward our fisheries as unfriendly and conspicuously unbusinesslike, and tending to destroy valuable national industry and an indispensable resource of defense against foreign enemy. The name of American applied alike to all citizens of the republic, and imposes upon men alike the same obligation of obedience to the laws. At the same time citizenship is and must be the monopoly and safeguard of him who wears it, should shield and protect him whether high or low, rich or poor, in all his civil rights. It should and must afford him protection at home and follow and protect him abroad in whatever land he may be on a lawful errand.

CIVIL SERVICE REFORM.

The men who abandoned the republican party in 1884 and continue to adhere to the democratic party have deserted not only the cause of honest government, but of sound finance, of honest and pure in the ballot, but especially have deserted the cause of reform in the civil service. We will not fail to keep our eyes fixed on our service aspirants, and because their candidate has broken his, we therefore repeat our declaration of 1884, to wit: The reform of civil service aspirants begun under republican administration should be completed by a further extension of the reform system already established by law to all grades of the service to which it is applied. The spirit and purpose of reform should be observed in all places, made by a loyal people, and be so enlarged and extended as to provide against the possibility that any man who honorably served in the army or navy shall become an inmate of an almshouse or dependent upon public charity. In the presence of an overflowing treasury it would be a public scandal to do less for those whose valorous service preserved the government. We denounce the hostile spirit shown by President Cleveland in his numerous vetoes of measures for pension relief, and the action of the democratic house of representatives in refusing even consideration of general pension legislation.

In support of the principles herewith enumerated, we invite the co-operation of patriots of all parties, and especially of all working men whose prosperity is seriously threatened by the free trade policy of the present administration. We urge the nation to the defenders of the union cannot be assured except by laws. Lieutenant Governor. Secretary of State. State Treasurer. Auditor of Public Accounts. Attorney General. Commissioner of Public Lands and Buildings. And the transaction of such other business as may come before the convention.

The several counties are entitled to representation as follows, being based upon the vote cast for Hon. Samuel Maxwell, judge, in 1887, giving one delegate at large to each county, and for each 150 votes, and major fraction thereof:

It is recommended that no proxies be admitted to the convention except such as are held by persons residing in the counties from which the proxies are given.

To Chairmen County Central Committees: WHEREAS, At the republican state convention held at Lincoln October 5, 1887, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the state central committee be instructed to embrace in its call for the next state convention the submission of the prohibition question to the republican voters at the republican primaries. Therefore, in accordance with the above resolution, the several county central committees are hereby instructed to include in their call for their next county convention the submission of the prohibition question to the REPUBLICAN voters at the republican primaries.
