We wish the Journal and all our democratic friends who earn their bread by honest work and who are not laying awake of nights expecting an office from Grover Cleveland would read the following argument made by one of the ablest advocates, and democrats in the present congress. It is the only national argument that can be made on the wage feature of this new industrial departure which was the cherished dream of the slave owner of ante-bellum days. THE REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.

The republicans of the United States, assembled by their delegates in national convention, pause on the threshold of their proceedings to honor the memory of their first great leader and immortal champion of liberty and the rights of the people, Abraham Lincoln, and to remember with gratitude the heroic names of our later leaders who have been more recently called away from our councils, Grant, Garfield, Arthur, Logan and Conkling. May their memory be faithfully cherished. We also recall the names of our living heroes whose memory will be treasured in the history both of the noble soldier and of the statesman.

We are proud of our UNSWERVING DEVOTION to the national constitution and to the indissoluble union of states to the autonomy reserved to the states under the constitution; to the personal rights and liberties of citizens in every citizen, rich or poor, native or foreign born, white or black, to cast one free ballot in the ballot box, and to have our rights duly counted. We hold a free and honest popular ballot and just and equal representation of all people in the conduct of our national government and demand effective legislation to secure the integrity and purity of the ballot box and the sanctity of the public authority. We charge that the present administration and the democratic majority in congress have conspired to nullify the constitution and laws of the United States.

WE WILL SUPPORT INTERESTS OF AMERICA. We demand that the interests of the people be maintained. Its abandonment has already been followed by its sacrifice to all interests except those of the unscrupulous and selfish. We denounce the Mills' bill as destructive to general business, labor, and the farming interest; and we demand that the tariff be so adjusted as to protect our industries from foreign competition, and to give employment to our labor, and to increase the production of our resources. ADMISSION OF TERRITORIES.

The government by congress of the territories is based upon necessity only to the end that they may become states in the union; therefore, the material resources, public intelligence and moral character of the people of the territories should be such as to make them fit to be admitted as states in the union under the constitution. We demand that the territories be so governed as to make them fit to be admitted as states in the union under the constitution.

THE MORNING QUESTION.

OUR MERCHANT MARINE.

We earnestly recommend that prompt action be taken by congress in the enactment of such legislation as will best secure the interests of our American merchant marine, and to protect against the passage by congress of a free ship bill as calculated to work injury to our labor by lessening the wages of those employed in preparing for service, and to demand appropriations for the early rebuilding of our navy, for the construction of coast fortifications and modern ordnance and other necessities for the payment of just pensions to our soldiers, for necessary works of national importance in the improvement of our harbors and channels of internal, coastwise, and foreign commerce, for the encouragement of

the shipping interests of the Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific states as well as for the payment of the maturing public debt. This policy will give employment to our labor, activity to our various industries, increased security to our country, promote trade, open new and direct markets for our products and cheapen the cost of transportation. We affirm this to be far better for our country than the democratic policy of loaning the government's money without interest to "pet banks."

FISHERIES QUESTION.

The conduct of foreign affairs by the present administration has been distinguished by inefficiency and cowardice.
