Gas Explosions on Steamships.

With the object of reducing the danger of explosions of gas in the bunkers of her majesty's ships, the admiralty have issued new rules for the government of the steam reserves. According to these, directly after the coaling of a ship is finished, the engineer officer is to see that the coal shutes are quite clear of coal. Coal should not be taken or board wet, as moisture sometimes causes a rapid and dangerous generation of heat and gas. While the decks are being washed after coaling, the close bunker covers are to be replaced to prevent water passing into the bunkers, and the coal should always be kept as dry as possible. The ventilating pipes to bunkers, when so fitted, should be kept clear. No light, except in a safety lamp, is to be used inside the coal bunkers until it has been ascertained that they do not contain explosive gas; and special precautions in this respect are to be taken for a few days after coaling. Where coal bunkers are not provided with permanent ventilating fittings, the lids are to be taken off twice a week, and kept off at least ten hours during the week. Every precaution is to be taken to ventilate such bunkers before men are sent to work in them. In order to render the ventilation efficient there must be at least two openings -one for the admission of pure air, and the other for the escape of foul air-and, where the two permanent ventilating fittings do not include both, the bunker lids are to be taken off periodically .- London Times.
