We earnestly recommend that prompt action be taken be corgress in the eractment of such legistation as will best secure the rebabilitation of our American merchant marine, and we protest against the passage by congress of a free ship bill as calculated to work injustice to labor by lessening the wages of those en gaged in preparing materials as well as those directly employed in our shipyards. We demand appropriations for the early rebuilding of our navy, for the construction of coast fortifications and modern ordinance and other spproved modern means of defense for the protection of our defenseless harbors and cities, for the payment of just persions to, our soldiers, for necessary works of national importance in the improvement of the harbors and channels of internal coastwiser and foreign commerce, for the Alantic, Gni and Pacific states as well as for the payment of the shipping interests of the Alantic, Gni and Pacific states as well as for the payment of the naturing public debt. This policy will give employment to our labor, actavity to our various industries increased security to our country, promote trade, open new and direct markets for our products and cheapen the cost of transportation. We affirm this to be far better for our country than the democratic policy of loaning the government's money without interest to "pet banks."

The conduct of foreign affairs by the present administration has been distinguished by inefficiency and cowardice. Having withdrawn from the senate all pending treaties effected by republican administratiors for the removal of foreign burdens and restrictions upon our commerce and for its extension into a better market it has neither affected nor proposed any others in their stead. Professing adherence to the Monroe doctrine, it has seen with idle complacency the extension of foreign trade everywhere among our neighbors. It has refused to charter, sanction or encourage any America, and necessa

FISHERIES QUESTION.

We arraign the present democratic administration for its weak and unpatriotic treatment of the fisheries question, and its pusillaminous surrender of all privileges to which our fishery vessels are entilled in Canadian perts under the treaty of 1818, the reciprocate marintine legislation of 1830 and comity of nations, and which Canadian fishing vessels receive in the ports of the United States. We condemn the reliey of the present administration and the democratic majority in congress towards our fisheries as unfriendly and conspiciously unpatriotic and as tending to destroy a valuable national industry and an indispensible resource of defense against foreign enemy.

CIVIL SERVICE REFORM. We denounce the hostile spirit shown by President Cleveland in his numerous vetoes of measures for pension relief, and the action of the democratic house of representatives in refusing even consideration of general pension legislation.
