# ELECT HARRISON FIRST.

Hon. Knute Nelson says that "it is the duty of the republicans to elect Harrison this year and strike for tariff reform afterward." Mr. Nelson was one of the three republicans who voted in favor of the Mills' bill. However, his declaration is worthy of the consideration of all republicans, whatever may be their views on the tariff question. Elect Harrison first. and then attend to the tariff afterward. Of course, the success of Harrison would be a comparatively barren triumph for the republicans without the election of a majority of the house of representatives. That body has been controlled by the democrats since 1883, and in that period no tariff reform has been made, nor, indeed, has any been attempted. The measures which were prepared by Mr. Morrison, like that which was framed this year by Mr. Mills, would, if enacted, destroy instead of reform or revise.
