## FIFTIETH CONGRESS.

**Senate.**  
WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—In the senate this morning Mr. Edmunds reported from the committee on foreign relations the following order:  
Ordered: That the president of the senate be directed to withhold transmission to the house of representatives of the act (house bill) to prohibit the coming of Chinese laborers to the United States until further direction of the senate.

He asked for its immediate consideration, but Mr. Teller objected, and it went over until tomorrow.  
The Chinese bill has already passed from the custody of the senate and is in that of the house, ready to go to the president.

Mr. Edmunds also offered a joint resolution appropriating \$100,000, to be expended under the direction of the president of the United States, in relief of the suffering caused by yellow fever now prevailing in Florida, and asked for its immediate consideration. After brief remarks the resolution was passed.

Mr. Sherman's resolution as to Canadian affairs was, at the request of Mr. Morgan, postponed until tomorrow.

Mr. Jones of Arkansas proceeded to address the senate on a motion to refer the president's annual message, and discussed from a democratic standpoint, the question of the surplus and of a protective tariff, which he declared to be "a system of naked robbery."

Mr. Stewart next addressed the senate, expressing views directly opposite of those put forward by Jones, but declaring that the existing stagnation and depression of prices did not result from the tariff but from the demonitization of silver.

At the close of Mr. Stewart's speech the house bill to authorize the construction of a bridge across the Missouri river within one mile north or south of the mouth of the Kansas river was taken up and passed with amendments.

The senate bill appropriating \$750,000 for a postoffice at St. Paul, Minn., was then passed and the senate adjourned.

## House.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—The house resumed consideration of the conference report on the sundry civil appropriation bill.

Mr. White, of Indiana, favored the adoption of the conference report, while Mr. Holman opposed it.  
Mr. Kerr, of Iowa, said that if congress had been deceived by the architect on the matter of estimates for the new library building it should not be in favor of voting another dollar to be spent under the supervision of that architect.

Mr. Adams, of Illinois, opposed the conference report, although he expressed his willingness to vote \$10,000,000 to erect a suitable building for the library. The vote on agreeing to the conference report resulted, yeas 67, nays 77—no quorum, and the house adjourned.

## The Yellow Fever.

JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 20.—The official report for the 24 hours ending at 6 p. m. yesterday, shows 140 new cases of fever, making a total so far reported of 1,333. A very large proportion of the new cases now are among the colored people living in the suburbs, and they will die rapidly unless cool nights soon prevail. The deaths reported today number 14. Total to date, 170. Efforts will be made to convince the negroes that it will be best for them to go to the refugee camp, but thousands will prefer to stay in the city if they can get free food. Rev. Mr. Snowden, rector of the Episcopal church at McClenny, died yesterday. No more cases are reported.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Sept. 20.—Today Montgomery's quarantine against Decatur is to be raised. There has been but one suspicious case of fever reported from that place, which was ten days ago, and it is felt that there is no further danger of trouble there.

## New Postmasters Appointed.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—The following Nebraska postmasters were appointed today: James Marsh, Aten, Cedar county, vice John Aten, resigned; O. H. P. Buchanan, Buchanan, Lincoln county, vice Butler Buchanan, resigned; Wm F. Skinner, Charleston, York county, vice Silas F. Wagner, resigned; John J. Downey, Dale, Custer county, vice Robert J. Kelly, resigned.

## A Mimic Naval Battle.

KEARNEY, Neb., Sept. 19.—The naval engagement on Lake Kearney this evening was one of the grandest exhibitions ever displayed in the west. The hillside overlooking the lake from the west was covered with spectators. Three batteries located on points on the opposite side of the lake were mounted with howitzers. The steamer Neptune approached them with lights suppressed, and when within range of the guns the battle began to rage. Ominous clouds overhung the scene. Sharp lightning added to illumination.

## A Rousing Republican Rally.

ULYSSES, Neb., Sept. 20.—A grand republican rally took place in Ulysses last night. The torchlight procession was a pretty sight, and consisted of one hundred republicans in uniform, sixty-four on horseback, headed by martial music. After the procession the audience assembled in the school house to listen to G. W. Lamberton, of Lincoln, and the David City glee club. Mr. Lamberton's speech was frequently interrupted by applause, but at no time was the clapping of hands so general as when he spoke in praise of Attorney General Leese and entreated all, both democrats and republicans, to give him their vote. At the close of the meeting three cheers were given for Harrison and Morton that made the windows rattle.

## A Clever Illinois Swindler.

TOLEDO, Ill., Sept. 18.—A swindler, as yet unknown, has succeeded in working Busey's Bank at Urbana to the amount of \$2500; J. W. Helm, of Danville, \$4500, and Gillet & Ball, \$1500. By the use of forged bills of lading he secured the payment of drafts on eastern houses for the above amounts. The drafts bore the name of Kizer Brothers, a well known grain firm at Hammond, Ill. The signatures, though clearly a forgery, were well calculated to deceive. Helm identified the man at Busey's Bank before he learned that he himself had been victimized. There is no clew to the swindler's real identity, and he has disappeared.

## A Fatal Boiler Explosion.

BLAIR, Neb., Sept. 20.—At 2 o'clock this afternoon the saw mill of M. Hamilton, situated on the bank of the Missouri, two miles east of this city, bursted, instantly killing two men and injuring half a dozen others. Those killed were Henry Alexander, fireman, and Henry Morrill, engineer. The injured are: John McKeen, slightly; John Noll, injured about the head, and Cody C. Pate, scalded. The boiler was one that had been used at this mill about two weeks, but had been used at the mill of Hamilton at Florence last winter. No defects were visible or known to the men so far as could be learned.

Mr. Noll is quite badly injured. He said at the time of the accident he was standing by the side of Mr. Alexander, the fireman, and was talking to him about putting on a belt that had just been fixed. The first intimation he had of anything being wrong was a moan from Alexander, looking at him he saw blood coming from his head and that same instant he was blown or knocked through a large iron wheel, the spokes of which had been broken in the explosion, and was landed in a safe place. Alexander was crushed and badly mangled. Morrill leaves a family consisting of a wife and several small children.

## Methodists at Beatrice.

BEATRICE, Sept. 19.—The Nebraska annual conference of the Methodist church opened in their spacious church here this morning with an attendance of 150 ministers and forty ladies. Bishop Foss, of Minneapolis, presided. After organization, Dr. J. W. Cox spoke on Sunday school tract societies and was followed by Bishop Taylor, on missionary work in Africa. This evening Dr. Gray gave an interesting address on the freedmen's aid society in the south. Members of the conference have been arriving all day and a large attendance is looked for. The people of Beatrice are kindly entertaining all who come. Among the members is Rev. W. K. Beams under whose pastorate in Beatrice the Methodists built their \$25,000 church.
