THE ACTION OF THE SIOUX.

Due to the Influence of Chiefs Call and Sitting Bull.

Why They Rejected the Treaty.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 22.—It is noticed during the conference between the Sioux Indians and Secretary Villars last week that while Little Wounded, Gray Eagle, and a half dozen other prominent chiefs had suggestions to make, and that they interpolated remarks from time to time during the translation of Secretary Villars' proposal, Chiefs Sitting Bull and Gall sat in apparent indifference in the rear of the room with their backs against the walls. They appeared throughout the pow-wow to have the least possible interest in the proceedings. Yet these two men did more than all the rest together towards securing the rejection of Secretary Villars' proposals. In fact, it is stated, now that the Indians have left, that but for the opposition of these two wary old warriors the majority would have acquiesced in the proposals, and that, instead of a failure, their visit would have been a success. Gall and Sitting Bull understand that the acceptance of the Sioux bill means the abolition of the power and the breaking up of the tribal relations of this powerful nation of red men. From the first their influence has been felt by the commissioners, and it was realized from the outset that more was to be feared from Sitting Bull and Gall than from all the others put together. The decision of the Indians yesterday brings to a final end negotiations under the act known as the Dawes bill, and it is not likely that anything further will be done for some time to come towards the opening of the Sioux reservation, as secretary Villars is determined not to depart one iota from the premises laid down by him when he informed the Indians that they must signify their willingness to accept as individuals before returning to their people.

A Terrible Catastrophe.

HOOPER, Neb., Oct. 21.—A terrible accident occurred at this place last night by which three persons were killed and two were seriously injured. About 10 o'clock p. m. Henry Schaffer, living four miles west of town, started for home. Accompanying him in the wagon was his stepson David Minnick, his sons Percival and Henry Schaffer, his son Daniel Schaffer, Thomas Roe and a Mr. Leig. As they drove up to the Elkhorn road a stock train was approaching from the west at a high rate of speed. It seems that the occupants did not see the train until it was upon them. Just before the engine struck them the mule team they were driving tarried down the track in the same direction that the train was going. The engine struck them, killing Henry Schaffer, jr., David Minnick and Percival Schaffer, and injuring Thomas Roe and Leig. Both lie in a precarious condition, with some chances of recovery. Henry Schaffer, jr. escaped, after being thrown about forty feet away. One of the mules was killed. The coroner's inquest was held today and a verdict rendered censuring the train crew for running at too high a rate of speed and not giving proper signals. One thing noticeable was that each of the victims was killed by being struck in the head.

Turner "Bluffs" Cleveland.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 22.—One of President Cleveland's last official acts before the adjournment of Congress was to fulfill his agreement with J. Milton Turner. The bill to pay the Cherokee freedmen \$75,000 received the President's official signature and became a law as he had promised J. Milton Turner on last Wednesday. The colored apostle of Democracy left on Thursday, according to agreement with the President, to take part in the campaign. The President was opposed to the bill, and had it not been for the dusky statesman from Mis-

souri undoubtedly he would have vetoed it. The secret of Turner's success in securing its approval is now made known. He coolly informed Mr. Cleveland that unless he signed the bill, J. Milton Turner, as a leader of the colored race, would at once renounce Democracy and carry with him into the Republican camp some 40,000 colored Democrats from the doubtful States. The argument was most convincing and the President yielded. He stipulated, however, that Turner should make an active canvass among the colored voters in the doubtful States until election. The bill is now signed, and Mr. Turner has gone on his missionary tour.

The Yellow Fever.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 22.—The last two days have witnessed a decided increase in the number of new cases, and today the death record is not very encouraging. Dr. Neal Mitchell, president of the board of health, reports 27 new cases up to 6 p. m. today; deaths, 4; total cases to date, 3,796; total deaths, 331.
