A Rouser at Elmwood.

ELMWOOD, Neb., Oct. 25.—Probably the most enthusiastic political demonstration ever exercised in this part of the county was shown last night. The announcement that Hon. J. C. Watson, of Nebraska City and Judge O. P. Mason, of Lincoln, were to address the meeting, brought republicans and democrats in from miles around, and our little village fairly trembled under the moving mass. The Weeping Water republican Flaubean club was present in full attire. At 4:45 p. m. the train carrying the orators arrived from the east and was met at the depot by a large delegation. Among the noted arrivals were Hon. J. C. Watson, Judge O. P. Mason, Hon. Paul Schmicke, the Hon. Ed. Geary and others. A good delegation of Weeping Water business men were present.

When the Weeping Water band struck up the national airs, and the Flaubean club paraded, the Grand Army hall was quickly filled with an intelligent and appreciative audience, and hundreds were unable to gain admittance after the standing room was occupied, and stood around the doors and windows and heard if they could not see the speakers.

The Hon. Paul Schmicke spoke first, and in a pointed way showed the difference between his native country (Germany) and America, in the matter of wages for workmen. He then paid a glowing tribute to Hon. J. C. Watson, candidate for lieutenant representative for Cass and Otoe counties, and assured the audience that if they elected Johnnie they would have no reason to regret it, comparing his ability with that of his opponent, J. M. Higgins, to the complete discomfiture of the latter. His remarks were frequently applauded.

The Hon. J. C. Watson then took the stand and for about an hour entertained the audience with a masterly speech which captivated his hearers and convicted them that in him Cass and Otoe counties would have a representative to whom they could safely trust their interests in the legislature, without any fears that he would not be able to keep up with the procession.

Judge O. P. Mason was the next speaker and delivered one of the strongest, most convincing and eloquent addresses of the campaign. He spoke more particularly of the transportation question in connection with the tariff. The figures he gave were absolutely convincing and the conclusions he reached were incontrovertible. It is impossible to analyze the speech. Sufficient to say the judge was at his best and as his magnificent climaxes were reached the crowd fairly paltered with excitement. A thorough speaking campaign is organized in Cass county and we expect a good majority for the entire republican ticket.

Bad Wreck on the Alton.

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., Oct. 25.—A bad accident occurred on the Jacksonville division of the Chicago & Alton road, near San Jose, this morning. A freight train collided with an east bound train composed of empty coaches while running at a high rate of speed. Both engine crews jumped to save their lives. Fireman Baum, of the freight train, was caught and crushed to a pulp. Engineer Foote, of the same engine, was pinned under the wreck and badly hurt. The engineer and fireman on the other train were seriously injured, but will recover. Both locomotives and seventeen cars were destroyed.

Runaway Accident.

ARLINGTON, Neb., Oct. 25.—This afternoon about 5 o'clock, as Barn-y Jungblut a farmer who resides about four miles north of this place, was starting home with a four horse load of lumber, his horses became frightened at the cars and ran away, scattering the lumber promiscuously, also throwing Mr. Jungblut to the ground, breaking his right arm in two places below the elbow, and bruising him about the head. The team which is valued at about \$750, was badly injured by running into a wire fence.

They Should Learn to Work.

One of the common errors of rich parents is the failure to teach their children how to earn their own living, so that, should their fortunes melt away, they would not be compelled to live on charity. It is by no means an uncommon thing to see men and women, who have been reared in luxury, living in poverty, serving as waiters or in some capacity where they can barely earn the necessities of life. These persons have been "educated," as generally understood, but they well illustrate the need of practical instruction. Possessing only book learning, when thrown on their own resources, they are helpless.

It is gratifying to see a tendency in some quarters towards a different course. A rich lady in this city, whose daughters speak various languages, and have been otherwise educated in the conventional way, recently placed them in the kitchen to receive practical instruction in cooking and housework. Fortunately they submitted with good grace and will soon make bread, broil steak and do other such work. In another family the girls are learning dressmaking. The late Charles Crocker, the California millionaire, stated that he compelled all his sons to learn some practical way of earning their own living in case the time should come when they might have to do so.

It is best for the children of all parents, rich and poor, that they should have such an education. Many parents regret, when it is too late, that they did not follow this course. In connection with this matter it is well to bear in mind the great benefit that would flow from a little more practical instruction in schools. The step taken in that direction by the partial addition of manual training should be followed up by still more radical reforms. There is need of less "higher instruction" and more practical training.—New York News.
