have to do so. It is best for the children of all parents, rich and poor, that they should have such an education. Many parents regret, when it is too late, that they did not follow this course. In connection with this matter it is well to bear in mind the great benefit that would flow from a little more practical instructions in schools. The step taken in that direction by the partial addition of manual training should be followed up by still more radical reforms.
