CITY CORDIALS.

—Mr. Verner depicted the character with great force and earnestness.—Buffalo Times.

—The sewers are being washed out and preparations made for the inspection of the work, today.

—Hot supper will be served by the daughters of Rebekah in the opera house building at six o'clock tonight; oysters will also be served.

—The funeral of the late Chaplain Wright will take place Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Presbyterian church. Services will be conducted in the Presbyterian church by the Rev. J. T. Baird.

—All persons intending to take part in the "Old Fashioned District School," are requested to meet at G. A. R. Hall this evening at 7:30 o'clock, promptly, for rehearsal. Those having old readers or spelling books, please bring them.

—The jury which was sent out Wednesday evening on the case of Patrick Moore, of Weeping Water, who was arrested for robbery, returned a verdict of guilty, as charged in the complaint. He will receive his sentence this afternoon.

—Mr. Verner brings to the role that fidelity and earnestness, which an actor with Irish blood in his veins can scarcely fail to reveal in impersonating such a part. [Buffalo Courier.] He will appear at Waterman opera house, Tuesday evening, December 4.

—Harry Westlake, an accomplice with Charley Ellis in the robbery of Keough, who had his trial on Wednesday, was found guilty of larceny from the person. He will receive his sentence this afternoon, but the shortest time which can be allowed is one year's imprisonment in the penitentiary.

—The largest assemblage yet seen in the opera house this season witnessed "The Mascott," presented by the Andrews opera company last evening. The opera was a light comedy, but very fascinating, and judging by the strong applause the performance was much appreciated. The leading voices were all very fair, especially the baritone, Mr. Percy, who played the part of Pippo, the shepherd boy. The citizens showed due appreciation to Manager Young in turning out in such a good number. The receipts amounted to over \$250.

—Thanksgiving day was pretty generally observed in this city yesterday. Nearly every business house was closed in the forenoon, and in the afternoon business was entirely suspended. A union service was held at the M. E. church in the morning at 11 o'clock, when a sermon was preached by Rev. J. T. Baird, of the Presbyterian church. He addressed a large assemblage, the church being filled to the doors. Many commendations have been heard in regard to the excellent sermon by the reverend gentleman, and all who heard him were well repaid for attending. Services were also held in the Episcopal church by the pastor, Rev. H. B. Burgess.

—The Sheriff received a dispatch from Robert Clark, of Cedar Creek, stating that a robbery had been committed, requesting him to go immediately. Deputy Sheriff Miller started out as soon as possible, and shortly after his arrival there telegraphed the Sheriff that he had secured the thief, but no further particulars were given, more than that he would return by No. 30 with the prisoner. Word has also been received here that there were two robbers there last night and that the one man committed the two robberies. His name was given as Crayton. One charge against him was for stealing billiard balls.

An Esteemed Citizen Passed Away.

DIED.—At his residence, corner Eighth and Elm streets, in this city, at 7:40 a. m., November 30, 1888, Chaplain A. Wright, aged 75 years, 7 months and 14 days.

Another light among our esteemed citizens has been extinguished in the death of Chaplain Wright. The news struck the city like a thunderbolt, when it was learned that he had breathed his last about 8 o'clock this morning. He has suffered for years with kidney disease, and of late, that, with complications, have afflicted him so severely that he has been confined to his bed for the past three weeks, or more, during which time he has suffered intensely. All available aid was rendered him during his siege of illness, but his fast declining constitution, brought on by advanced years, could not guard off the attack, and succumbed only when the efforts of his many attendants could not afford him relief.

Rev. Alpha Wright, Post Chaplain United States Army (retired), was born at Wilmington, Windham county, Vermont, April 16, 1813. When quite young he removed with his parents to Bath, Stuten county, New York. In 1835 he was ordained at Canandaigua, New York, by Bishop Morris, of Ohio; he then labored in the M. E. church in the states of New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Wisconsin and Missouri, from 1836 to 1863, when he was appointed Chaplain of the Twenty-fifth Missouri Volunteers Infantry. He was stationed at St. Louis, Mo., on the staff of Gen. Ewing, and had charge of the refugees and contrabands for the department of Missouri, serving till the war closed. December 11, 1866, he was appointed chaplain in the United States army; was stationed at Fort Laramie, W. T., four years, at Fort Russell, W. T., two years. In 1872 was appointed chaplain at Fort Omaha, remaining in that position until relieved at his own request, October 3, 1879. In 1866 Chaplain Wright purchased land at Plattsmouth, built on it in the summer of 1867 and moved his family here. He united with the Presbyterian church, and since November, 1879, has had charge of the Presbyterian church at Bellevue, until the last three or four years, but was forced to retire on account of rapidly relaxing strength and vigor, and since then has resided at his home in this city.

The funeral has been arranged to take place Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, but further notice will appear in tomorrow's issue.

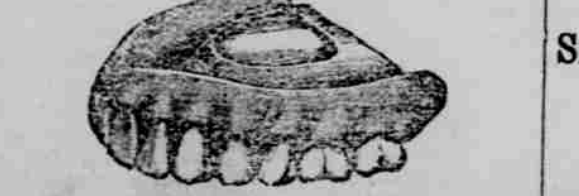
