All | Second street between Main and Granite members of the order are requested to be street, to be used for yard purposes, for the land owned by the company between Main and Granite now used as an alley lying about one-half of a block west of Second Street, was heard. The company has agreed to fill up the creek over which the alley passes and to leave it in a passable condition for the city's use. The council accepted the report.

Resolved. In case the said contractor fails to comply with the said request at the time mentioned that the board of public works be instructed to make the said repairs and charge same to said contractor, taking the expense thereof from at a further Reduction of 20 per cent,

Accepted. To the Hon. Mayor and city ccuncil of

to the honorable board of public works in case I fail to make repairs and remedy any defects that may appear thereto, and and I hereby consent to the propositions thereof and agree to remedy the said defects to the satisfaction of the city sengineer, the board of public works, and also the Hon. Mayor and city council.

Yours respectfully. J. E. RILEY. To the honorable board of public works, Plattsmouth, Neb., gentlemen. I hereby submit final estimate of the curbing and paving of Main street under the contract with J. E. Riley, contractor. This work has defects both in irregularity sand used. The sand for filling the upper joints should be a coarse bank sand and should not only be thoroughly raked over the surface, but also rammed into every crevice between the joints to insure firmness. The blocks in many places, parcurl-s, are set roughly and will need to be readjusted and rammed into place. Some of the curbing will also need to be relined to complete a good job. This work is faulty more or less owing to poor workmen employed and the carelessness of the foreman. The lateness of the season renders it impossible to correct these defects at this time and secure good results. The cost of readjustment and additional course sand will be from \$700

to \$1.000.
