#### DISADVANTAGES OF A UNION WITH CANADA.

The public debt of the Canadian Dominior, however formidable, would have to be paid or assumed by the United States in case of a political union. Its present amount in proportion to population is more than three times as much as that of the United States; and the latter is being rapidly reduced, while that of the Dominion for the last twenty years has steadily increased in every year except

We do not need the Canadiad Dominion as a place of refuge for redundant population. We do not need it for the purpose of enrolling their young men in our army.
